### THE SCHOOLS AND THE COUNTY FAIR

To the Public Schools of Tillamook County:

The fair board desires a good showing of school exhibits at the 1915 fair, August 24, 25, 26 and 27. The county school superintendent is working on the school prize list, to be published in our county fair premium list some time in March. We expect, however, to publish a circular list for the use of the schools, very soon, possibly next week. At this time would state that school districts are requested to make display of a booth on the following conditions: School work displayed 33 1/2 per cent; articles in industrial list 33 1/2 per cent; general decoration and display 33 1/2 per cent. Any article in a booth may be entered in any individual exhibit for prizes. Booths are to be classed as follows: Class A, schools of one room; class B, schools of two rooms; class C, schools of more than two rooms.

Owing to the fact that only one school in the county is provided with manual training instruction, this branch will be barred in the booth competition; they may be in booth however, and may be entered in individual exhibits.

Please get busy and prepare for exhibits in the three classes.

### SCHOOL ENTERTAINMENT TO BUY PICTURES

The public school are giving an entertainment Friday evening, February 26, at the school house, for the purpose of raising funds to buy pictures. Every grade will have a part in the program, and nearly every child in school will appear somewhere. The numbers will be largely of a patriotic nature.
