My Dear Editor:

Will you please say through the columns of your paper this week the following:

Feld Worker and Club Organizer, Prof. F. L. Griffin will spend the week from March 1 to the 5th, in the schools of the county. He will have his lanterns and slides and give illustrated talks where practicable. Agriculturalist R. C. Jones and County Superintendent Buel will accompany Mr. Griffin and assist him in his work. It is the intention to make as many schools as possible. Since it is quite impossible to reach every school in the county in one week, and that being all the time allotted to us by Mr. Griffin, we have planned the following schedule. It is hoped that the school patrons and every one interested in the movement will attend these meetings. It is also suggested that schools, not included in this schedule but are sufficiently near to attend a meeting of some school included, discontinue for a period and teacher and pupils attend in a unit. Every one within reach is especially requested to attend the evening sessions, and get some good lessons along the lines which Mr. Griffin shall speak, and see his selection of pictures.

## RESUME OF WORK OF STATE LEGISLATURE

Solons of Twenty-Eighth Session Complete Their Labors at Salem.

Salem.—The 28th biennial session of the legislature is a matter of history. The closing hours witnessed the usual confusion and congestion and in addition there was a deadlock between the house and senate which threatened to become serious.

The conflict arose over the refusal of the senate to receive from its amendment to the Schuebel house compensation bill. The house refused to accept the senate amendment reducing the membership of the industrial accident commission to one member and in retaliation declined to pass the senate bill conferring upon the governor or appointing board as the case may be the power of removal of appointees at any time and the bills consolidating the insurance and corporation departments and the highway and state engineer's offices. The fight was enlivened by a letter from Miss Fern Hobbs offering to resign her place on the industrial accident commission if the senate would pass the house bill. An agreement was finally reached whereby each house receded from its position.

The agreements failed in one particular. The house did not pass the bill consolidating the offices of corporation and insurance commissioner. The merger of the highway and state engineer's offices was accomplished.

Prohibition Law Most Important.

What many regard as the most important piece of legislation passed at this session was the prohibition bill to make effective the prohibition constitutional amendment which will become effective January 1, 1916. The bill permits the importation from without the state of a small quantity of liquor, makes consignees receipts public records and prohibits liquor advertising and solicitation of orders.

Next to the prohibition act, the most important piece of legislation passed amended the workmen's compensation act. The amendments provide for several classifications of risks, change the rates different industries shall pay into the fund, reduce the payments of employes and eliminate the law which gave the injured workmen the choice of compensation or an action at law.

Tax Measures Passed.

Two tax measures of importance have been passed. One is the highway bill which places a limit on the amount of revenue that may be raised in any one year. The other tax law divides the tax payments into two installments. If the first half is not paid by April 5 it draws interest at 1 per cent a month. A penalty on unpaid taxes does not attach until November 5, when 5 per cent is added.

The public accountancy department has been eliminated.

Election Laws Amended.

The election laws have been amended in important particulars. A method for permanent registration has been provided. A fee system for nominating candidates which will make the paid name solicitors unnecessary, but still available, has been adopted. By the terms of the latter bill the aspirant for nomination pays his money into the state, county and city treasury instead of petition peddlers.

Another election law restores the full franchise to the voters in election of delegates to national conventions and eliminates the payment of delegates' expenses out of the public treasury.

Special Election Ordered if Needed.

A special election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November for the purpose of considering measures enacted by the recent legislative sessions was passed.

The bill does not provide for an election unless the referendum is invoked against any of the measures passed by this session.

Friends of the prohibition measure were particularly interested to have the bill passed, as they fear a referendum will be applied.

Most of the members of the legislature regard the session as having been successful, particularly in the matter of economy. The appropriations for the session will total about \$6,500,000, or about \$1,500,000 less than those of the preceding session.

Legislators Joyful on Adjournment.

Fun and good fellowship reigned supreme in the halls of the capitol Sunday morning, following adjournment by the two houses. The house adjourned precisely at 2 minutes after 7, but the senate was in session an hour longer.

Members of the house were joyful after they had cleaned up their work.

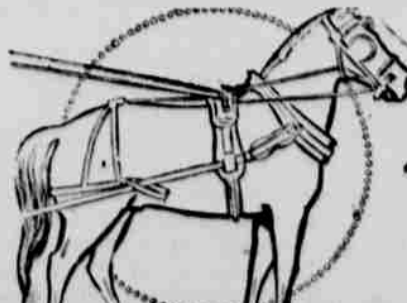
Led by Representatives Littlefield, Olds, Stewart and Gill they gathered about Miss Towne's desk and sang a series of popular and patriotic songs.

While the house members were in the midst of their singing someone suggested: "Let's go over and serenade the senate."

The idea proved popular. The whole party, consisting of nearly 40 members, marched around the rotunda and straight through the doors of the senate chamber, where the sleepy-eyed senators were awakened by the strains of "Auld Lang Syne."

The senators, led by Senator Day, gathered around Miss Towne and gave her three "hurrahs" and a "tiger."

The house members returned the compliment to Miss Clarke, the only woman senator.
