ALLIES' ACTION MOMENTOUS

England and France Send Notes Forbidding Shipments to Germany.

Washington.—All commercial intercourse by sea between Germany and the outside world was declared prohibited by Great Britain and France. Identical notes presented by the French and British ambassadors here informed the United States government of this drastic step by the allies in reply to Germany's war zone proclamation.

If this policy is enforced it will no longer be possible to ship cotton, manufactured articles and commodities hitherto of a non-contraband character from the United States to Germany directly or indirectly, and from the latter country the supply of dyestuffs and other merchandise for consumption in this country will be cut off.

It was regarded as practically certain that the United States would reply promptly with an inquiry as to how the step was to be carried into practice, together with a protest against the announcement that commerce between Germany and neutral countries hereafter would be interrupted by the allies.

ALLIES' SHIPS SHELL TURKS' INNER FORTS

London.—Twenty-eight warships of the allied fleet entered the Dardanelles and bombarded the inner forts, according to a dispatch from Athens.

After having completed the destruction of the forts at the entrance of the Dardanelles, the allied fleet of British and French warships, the greatest which has ever been in action, attacked the chief forts, which heretofore have stood between Turkey and invasion by the sea.

Apparently the outer forts could not withstand a great bombardment, and when they had been leveled and deserted by their defenders, men were landed from the ships to complete the work of demolition, while mine-sweepers cleared a passage for ships in the straits.

At the head of the fleet is the Queen Elizabeth, one of England's latest super-dreadnoughts, which has been commissioned since the war began and which mounts eight 15-inch guns.

The steady progress of the international fleet against the fortresses heretofore regarded as impregnable has caused terror in Constantinople.

BRIEF WAR NEWS

The Russian successes in the region of Przasnysz, north Poland, and Kolmea, east Galicia, and the successful progress of the operations of the allied fleet in the Dardanelles were the most important events of the war during the past week.

The Russian offensive operations appear to extend along the whole front an indication that the Russians have been able to bring strong reinforcements into the field. They have successfully checked the German advance in north Poland, where the German are reported to be in retreat, and the recapture of Przasnysz after severe fighting has given them an excellent pivot point from which to carry on their further operations.

The allies do not believe that their success in the Dardanelles undertaking will be immediate, for they are now facing the hardest part of the problem, having the strongest fort ahead of them, although the guns of these forts have not the range of the guns of the larger ships, particularly the 15-inch guns of the Queen Elizabeth.

While eight British ships have been destroyed in the first week that the blockade has been in force, it is pointed out that they are for the most part small vessels, and that the majority of them, instead of having food for this country, were either in ballast or carrying coal or other freight for neutral countries.

In the house of commons Sir Edward Grey, secretary for foreign affairs, made the important announcement, which was received with cheers that Great Britain sympathized with Russia's aspirations to gain access to the open sea through Turkey.

The Belgian army, reorganized and re-equipped, again has been taking part in the fight for the recovery of its country, and, according to the French report, has advanced across the Yser and taken a farm from the Germans, while its artillery has demolished two German works.

Otherwise the battles in the west are still confined to the Champagne and the Vosges, where both sides claim to have been successful.

Will Exchange Wounded.

Berlin, by wireless to Sayville, L. I.—It was announced here that France and Germany had reached an agreement whereby seriously wounded prisoners, incapable of returning to the front, were to be exchanged.

Churches Unite in Peace Letter.

New York.—The Church Peace Union, founded a year ago by Andrew Carnegie, through its secretary, the Rev. Frederick Lynch, made public here a message which the union has addressed to "the churches and clergy of America," cautioning ministers and church people against partisanship in discussing the European war, and protesting against the present agitation for increased armaments. This is said to be the first time in church history that Catholics and Protestants have joined in signing a common letter addressed to the churches.

Utah House Votes Dry.

Salt Lake City, Utah.—The Wooten state-wide prohibition bill passed the house by a vote of 40 to 5. It passed the senate about two weeks ago.

The senate bill was amended by the house to prohibit the manufacture of wine for sacramental or personal use, and to make it effective July 1, 1916, instead of June 1, 1916.

Oregon Mutual Company Falls.

Salem, Or.—Upon application of the directors of the company, which is unable to meet its financial obligations, Circuit Judge Galloway appointed Harvey Wells, insurance commissioner, receiver of the Horticultural Fire Relief of Oregon, with offices in this city.

Gov. Lister Proclaims Salmon Day. Olympia, Wash.—Governor Lister has issued an official proclamation setting aside March 12, Friday of next week, for a state-wide celebration in honor of King Salmon.
