"We are facing a situation fraught with difficulties, and we are likely to see arise at any moment questions of such delicacy as to tax the judgment and the skill of our most experienced statesmen to solve, with due regard to what we owe to ourselves, as well as to others."

"An incident somewhere, might give rise to a storm of feeling, which in a moment of uncontrolled impulse might lead to the most deplorable results, quite against the better judgment of the nation. It is one most pressing duty now to prevent such an occurrence, and in keeping before ourselves the standards of life that we have set up for our guidance in America, to exert our influence, moral influence and leadership, in order that justice may triumph in the end."

"Washington's words are almost startling, when he says as Mr. Pendleton in 1793: 'The machine of the European powers, and the calumnious situation into which all of them are thrown by the present misions, may lead to a serious warning to us to avoid a similar catastrophe, as long as we can with honor and justice to our national character.'"

"We are the only great power, entirely free from European obligations of any kind. We have the respect and confidence of the nations involved in the war. How gladly we should welcome them if they turned to us and gave us the opportunity to establish peace in the world."
