The strong stand taken by our national administration against all war-like words or movements may at some measure be attributed to Vice-President Marshall's sentiment. He is an ultra pacifist. In expressing his position, recently he told of his visit to the mother and sisters of Yoninan De Lowry, a young Irish-American sailor who was killed in the attack on Vera Cruz. "I attended the funeral service for De Lowry in Pittsburgh," said the vice-president. "The bereaved mother and sisters lived in a humble flat. On the table was a frame photograph of the boy in naval uniform. His mother was a slender Irish woman and she may cradled her boy's picture with the Stars and Stripes. That would not appear me to take a conscientious role that I would support no war movement in this country unless the alien invader's foot was placed on our shores."

11. *Hatched Fly*, an English newspaper correspondent, writes from Petrograd to the London Daily Mail, condemning the benefits of prohibition in Russia. Next to the fact that Russia has become at once a potato country, he cites the stranger fact that "nobody makes any audible complaint." "Crime has become rarer. The records of the courts prove this. Savings bank deposits have increased enormously. The number of patients in Petrograd hospitals has fallen to a surprising degree. There are fewer accidents, as well as less disease. In the town of Saratov who used to spend their wages as soon as they got them are setting up in business for themselves. Peasants who, in yonder days, never put by a kopeck, are buying good plows and drills and harvesting machines. There is work for all, and wages are rather higher than they were before the war." And he adds: "There are no blind pigs as in Canada; and the druggists, who in the United States will sometimes 'oblige' with spirits and as medicine, are so terrified here that if you take them a prescription with alcohol in it they ring up your doctor to make sure you are not a fraud."

"It is a great opportunity for holding up the policies of a splendid man and a splendid administration," she said.
