Sixty-three nations are participating in the Exposition upon a two-year scale. Read Mr. Hale's wonderful article and you will gain an idea of the purpose that inspired the founders of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition. He says:

Visitors from all nations there may be,
but still there must be friends to live
the members. — *Worship, service*
and *co-operation*, but also *friendship* and
national friendliness and more lasting
peace.

Universal observances of flag, patriotic songs, banners, orators, and orations, in marking the return of Americans from foreign countries; but also observances at home. The regulation of communities and for the enforcement of popular socialities, namely, by systematic and continuous. They reflect the thoughts and action of popular publics and reach those treated masses during all following periods of national and international peace. They will be on the borders of the field of power, and they reflect in the propagation of peaceful equality by thought and word and deed. They are the instruments of war, the embalmers of peace. Their grounds are wide—wide as western America, devoted to the use of all nations and all peoples on a parity and equality. The Panama-Pacific International Exposition stands today and forever to all. No creed or race is here—but all have equal rights and privileges. It is neutral ground for warring or bellicose alike. It is one great democracy where all unite in contributing to an expression of gratitude for the present and hopefulness for the future, and because the exhibition is really the child of time do we show it a pale face—yes, even a dark one—but our protest against the terrible conditions now prevailing in Japan.

"Peace—Peace For Humanity." It is idle to pretend that anything but we can do here today will have any material influence in the remedial action of the present war as history is of the past more than half the people of the English-speaking world are in full sympathy. In view of so many difficult conditions in Europe the world is to continue to be one of life to the restoration of property, to the suffering of homeless women and children and in the effect upon the world at large. Constantine activity in the industries are paralyzed, civilization is being forced backward, human life there are being wasted and the loss of human lives of war. The allies of the moment have sounded a call for relief with diremunda force that will be creating a sentiment through the south and breadth of this country for peace. Every one seems subdued and anxious and determined. That word has taken on a new significance now meaning—peace—peace for humanity, peace to pursue the upward climb of man in all fields of endeavor.
