BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

More than 600 people attended community meeting held at Blaine, Ariz. A commercial club was launched at a meeting of business and farmers. The heavy rains of the past year have seriously affected the sheep pen of the Hood River valley. A Free museum, library and ball will be erected in Albany by J. L. Hill, a prominent pioneer citizen. Preparations are under way at Mitchell for the state convention of the Grand Army of the Republic to be held there June 14-15. All arrangements are now being made for the state convention of the Oregon Agricultural College to be held at the Macomber of the World to be held in Portland April 13 and 14. The contract for the construction of the proposed \$100,000 Elks Temple in Klamath Falls was awarded to Devoe & LeDoux, Portland contractor. The annual sheep shearing at Tillamook is now in full swing, with 15,000 sheep in town and 40,000 in large dry-herd flock plant near there. There will be probably 100,000 pounds of wool marketed through the county during the month. Former Mayor E. E. Strick of Tillamook was presented by a committee of that city with a large new house which was built by the city. The gift was in appreciation of his services for eight years while he was mayor of Marshfield. The first of the southern railroads is now on the road to Bend and Medford will continue for several miles. Altogether about 400,000 yards of pipe are expected to be used in the Crook county and half from Lake and other neighboring cities. That interest in being represented by the state engineer is being evidenced by the receipt of letters within the last few days from state engineer asking for letters. They have all been forwarded to Wallace, manager of the project. Governor Wilkey's commission had appointed C. E. Spence of City to succeed M. L. Jones of Medford, who recently resigned.
