

ROAD CONTRACTS LET.

Outside Contractors Under Bid
Local Contractors.

The April term of the County Court was held last week with County Judge A. M. Hare and Commissioners F. L. Owens and George R. McKimins present.

Claims of M. J. Gerson for expenses in 1924 election, the same was rejected.

In the matter of the petition of L. S. Kivrenge for a gateway, R. J. Shreve, C. P. Donaldson and V. Holden were appointed a board of county road viewers.

In the matter of the petition of P. W. Todd and W. Manning for return of taxes, the same was rejected.

In the matter of the petition of Wm. Maxwell for indemnity, the same was allowed.

In the matter of bids for the construction of buildings at the county fair grounds bids as follows were received: County and Shelton, \$7,340; Winters and Hill, Bidco and Franklin, \$7,400; Frank Hyde, \$7,400. The court rejected all bids, but on reconsideration the same were awarded the contract to Frank Hyde.

In the matter of the application of Fred Schamp to put in gates on owned county road on his land, he was permitted to do so.

In the matter of making an appropriation for the Tillamook County Fair, the court appropriated \$10,000.

In the matter of the petition of L. P. Gray and others for a writ of habeas corpus upon the return of the Board of Road Viewers with damages of \$2,000 to J. J. Hollett and \$1,000 to R. C. Condon, the petition was granted and the road ordered opened as a public highway.

In the matter of bids for the construction of the Standard road, the following bids were received: Joe Rutgers, Dick Rutgers and Dick Rutgers, \$8,202.32; C. S. Wells, W. H. Lorch, and C. W. Clements, \$8,202.70; John Jenck, \$7,900.00; J. J. Spencer, \$8,100.00. The latter was awarded the contract.

In the matter of bids for the construction of what is known as the Hollett road at P. E. Condon. The bids were: A. Arnold, \$4,200.00; C. S. Wells, W. H. Lorch and C. W. Clements, \$4,200.00; Jeffrey and Bitten, \$4,200.00. The latter was awarded the contract.

In the matter of petitions of the Oregon Timber Co., Portland, Timber Co. and J. H. K. Cook, for remission of taxes for the year 1924, in which the Portland Timber Co. claimed a 25% abatement, Luther K. Hake, George H. H. and the Oregon Lumber Co., Timber Co. and J. H. K. Cook, refused the abatement and remitted these claims.

In the matter of bids of what is known as the Grapple-Whitaker road only one bid was received that of the Tillamook Bay Construction Co. for \$2,000.00, which was accepted.

NO STATE AID FOR GRAND RONDE ROAD

Yamhill County Delegation Goes to Salem in Van.

Final apportionment of the state highway fund for 1915 was made Tuesday by the state highway commission at Salem when \$247,231 was divided among seven counties of the state. The Rex-Tigardville road was allocated \$2,231.

Regarding the meeting of which members of the county court, Senator Vinton and A. L. Jenkinson were present, the Stateman says:

"Although the commission was impeded by a delegation from Yamhill county to apportion at least \$10,000 to aid in constructing the proposed road from the Grand Ronde to the creek westward to Tillamook county to the coast, they were informed that any help this year from the state would be utterly impossible. (Judges of both the other counties made last year it was deemed not to be carried out. The commission, however, advised the Yamhill representatives that some help might be forthcoming next year.

County Judge Dodson, of Yamhill county, declared that the building of the road was most important and was desired by all the neighboring counties in Yamhill. He said that the road had been appropriated for by the Tillamook County for the last two years, but the total cost would be in excess of \$100,000 to \$120,000. W. T. Vinton, senator from Yamhill county, told the commission that the road was greatly needed.

"It is the disposition of the commission to help all of the counties," said Judge Dodson, "in paying in the Yamhill county delegation's request, but as you can see we have only so much money to divide and a large part of it already promised, the commission is simply up against a wall and cannot aid this year."—New Register.

Bad Accident at Blaine.

A serious accident happened at Blaine on Tuesday, when E. L. Kowalski was seriously injured by a rock striking him on the head from a blast. Kowalski was working on the county road with other men and placing a blast. They ran around a point of the road about 200 yards. They set down at what they thought to be safe distance and out of danger, he took a small blast in the rock. The man had evidently figured that the blast would go in a different direction. After this explosion one of the men saw a large rock coming across the blast and in the direction of the man. He dodged it but Kowalski was struck with his back to the blast, and the rock struck him in the back of the head and fractured his skull, some bone has been in the vicinity. He was brought to Dr. Buel's hospital, who attended the injured man. He was still after this morning, but the doctor says he cannot live but a few days. Kowalski is 35 years old today, and came to this county from Michigan and took up a homestead at Blaine. He has a wife and two small children.
