PORTLAND LETTER.

W. H. Combs has advised the city council to devote the period from May 1 to 15, inclusive, to the cleaning and painting up of unsightly yards and buildings. Mayor Combs designated the same dates for house work in Portland, and that the work is done, and that the Portland Chamber of Commerce has appointed a committee among its most energetic members to organize the different parts of the city into effective blocks and exercise a general supervision over the work.

It is almost certain that the present movement will see a greater movement of visitors to Portland, and other sections of Oregon, than any year since the Lewis and Clark Fair, and a concerted and concerted campaign should be carried on to make the city and state cleaner and more attractive than other sections of the northwest. California and Washington have been wielding paintbrushes for a long time, and it only remains for Oregon to get into line and make it three of a kind.

A plan inaugurated about three years ago by the Portland Union

Stockyards whereby the school children of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, by signing a 10-months note at 5 per cent, could receive high grade cows already bred and treated for cholera, has met with such unexpected success that it has been necessary to call a conference of the raisers of stock of that class to devise means for filling all the applications for stock. It is believed this campaign will be nation wide in its effects on the industry.

A movement has been started for the completion of the works of the Portland Cement Company at Oswego, which has been at a standstill for nearly three years. The buildings are ready for the machinery and the materials are at hand from which to make a high grade of cement. It is stated that recent sales of stock have been made amounting to over \$300,000 and that the company has \$50,000 on deposit. If the plant is put into operation it will be the only cement mill between Bellingham, Washington and points in California.

Survey of the Pacific Northwest Oregon's Oriental trade in grain, lumber and manufactured products has been increasing in importance for several years, largely as the result of a push of prominent business men in China, and the visit here in July will be in the nature of a return call.

Farmers' Short Course Interesting

Meetings Fairly Well Attended and Interest Good

On Sunday E. B. Fitts, R. E. Reynolds, C. C. Lamb, W. S. Brown, J. E. Larson and Miss Anna M. Turley, of the Oregon Agricultural College, arrived in the city accompanied by David Monroe of Spokane, one of the most prominent stock breeders of the northwest.

The program of the meeting has been carried out as previously advertised, except that on Monday morning Mr. Monroe gave an address on "The Influence of the Sire" in place of the address which Mr. Fitts was scheduled for at 11:30. Mr. Monroe's address was very interesting and instructive.

On Monday evening quite a large crowd gathered at the court house where illustrated lectures on poultry and plant diseases were given as previously advertised.

On Tuesday Mr. Monroe, Prof. Fitts and Prof. Larson in company with R. C. Jones went to Cloverdale where a meeting was held and addresses made.

Lectures and demonstrations on Domestic Science have been in progress at the Presbyterian Guild hall, under the direction of Miss Anna M. Turley of the Oregon Agricultural College. These lectures have been quite well attended.

On Wednesday afternoon a farm demonstration on tillage will be given at the Barr Beals ranch.

Two or three of the professors will go to Bay City on Wednesday afternoon and hold a meeting.

A public reception in honor of the visitors will be given at the Guild hall on Thursday evening.

MILK TESTERS SUPPLIED TO LANE RURAL SCHOOLS.
