RUSSIAN FRONT IN GALICIA IS BROKEN CHINA REFUSES MAIN JAPANESE DEMANDS

German Advance in Russian Baltic Sea Provinces is Also Unchecked. Some Concessions Made, But Most Important Provisions Are Thrust Aside.

London.—An imposing Austrian victory in West Galicia, in which the Russian front of 60 miles has been cut to pieces, was reported from Berlin and Vienna.
As though timed to take place simultaneously, a sweeping advance has been made in the Russian Baltic provinces by the Germans. Berlin and Petrograd agreeing that the invasion on a 150-mile front is unchecked. The direction in which this new and sudden stroke has been made, evidently in great force, lies to the south of Russian Poland.

The line along which the Austrian advance was made runs for about 60 miles north and south through Galicia, something more than 50 miles east of Cracow.

Vienna also reports great gains over the Russians who had succeeded in sweeping over the crest of the Carpathian range.

Thirty thousand Russian prisoners, 22 cannon and 64 machine guns and other war material in vast quantities declared impossible of estimation at this time, are asserted in Vienna official communications to have been the fruits of the Austro-German victory in West Galicia.

An official Russian communication admits that the Austro-German forces have crossed to the right bank of the Dniester River in Galicia. It says, however, that they were checked at the bank and that desperate fighting continues.

Peking.—China has replied to the Japanese demands in a note which, while complying with some of the demands, definitely refuses to accede to others, including the most important, embodied in what is known as Group V.

The list of Chinese concessions is in the nature of counter-proposals. China asks the right to participate in an international conference in which the altered status of Shan-Tung will be rearranged, opportunity for business incurred in consequence of the Young-Tsu campaign and also restoration of its status as before the war. These three requests are repeated from China's original counter-proposals.

Group V comprises seven articles relating to the employment by China of Japanese as advisers in political, financial and military affairs; supervision of the Chinese police; the right of Japanese ownership of land; Japanese supervision over the manufacture or purchase by China of munitions or war, various railway and mining rights and the right by the Japanese to propagate Buddhism in China.

Military preparations are being made for the defense of Peking. According to Chinese officials, whose statements have been corroborated in other circles, the government is making no preparations elsewhere than in the capital for defense, considering that the Chinese will be unable to oppose the Japanese should they make an attack.

2 TORPEDO-BOATS SUNK BY BRITISH

London.—A German submarine sank the British destroyer Recruit off the Galloper lightship in the North Sea. Other British destroyers after a stern chase overtook and sank the two German torpedo-boats that had accompanied the submarine on her cruise.

The destroyer Recruit was on patrol duty when the submarine sank her. The vessel signaled for assistance, and her call was answered by the trawler Daisy, and 39 men out of her complement of 65 were saved.

British torpedo-boat destroyers sighting in the distance two German torpedo-boats, which had sunk the trawler Columbia and apparently were supporting a submarine, engaged the Germans in the vicinity of the North Hinder light and sank them. The British boats rescued some of the crews of the Germans.

TORPEDO SINKS U. S. SHIP

A German Submarine Makes Attack Off Scilly Islands.

London.—The American oil tank steamship Guilflight was sunk by a German submarine off the Scilly Islands, according to a dispatch to the Central News Agency. The Guilflight sailed from Port Arthur, Tex., April 10, for Rouen, France.

The captain died from heart failure as a result of shock, and two seamen jumped overboard and were drowned. The other members of the crew were taken off by a patrolboat and landed. The vessel was towed into Crow Sound and beached.

TRAVELERS WARNED BY GERMAN EMBASSY

Washington.—In an official notice published by the German embassy in many important cities of the eastern part of the United States, Americans were warned that the travel on ships flying the flag of Germany's enemies was at their own risk.

While the notice was regarded among officials and diplomats here as nothing more than a reiteration of Germany's first warning given when the war zone about the British Isles was announced, there was much interest in whether it foreshadowed increased activity of German submarines or possibly had to do with movements of the German fleet, which has been variously reported of late as cruising in the North Sea.

Embassy officials in explaining the publication emphasized that it was intended as a warning to travelers and that the embassy had acted in accordance with its general instructions from the Berlin Foreign Office.

United States government will defer diplomatic representations, as well as any pronouncement of policy.

Britain Reported Retreating at Ypres. Berlin.—Official announcement of a heavy English defeat in the west and of victory for the Teutonic allies on the Carpathians front was made here. It was asserted that the British were retreating after heavy losses sustained in a hot fight near Ypres. The Russians were reported retreating along their whole Carpathian front. It was claimed they had evacuated Dukla pass and that already 30,000 prisoners had been taken by the Teutonic allies.

Peace Congress at The Hague Ends. The Hague.—All neutral countries will be invited to take steps for a conference at which they can offer continuous mediation to the warring European nations and also to invite suggestions from the belligerents themselves as to the most reasonable proposals for a basis for peace.

This, in effect, is about all that the Women's International Conference accomplished. The closing session was very turbulent.

Eastern France Raided by Airmen. Paris.—German aeroplanes, doubtless in reply to the recent French air attacks on Friedrichshafen, bombarded various towns of eastern France.
