R. M. Wade, president of the R. M. Wade & Co., wholesale dealers in implements and vehicles, died at his Comdon-contract let to Everett home, 400 Rodney avenue, at 4 o'clock Logan for \$2,750 Congregational yesterday afternoon. He was 80 years eld and was one of the pioneer merchants and implement men of Oregon.

Born in Johnson county, Missouri, be came to Oregon with his parents in 1850. They crossed the plains with an ox team. His father took up a donstion land claim near where Estacada

is now located. Young Wade lived on the farm three years, until he was 18, and then went to California, where he learned the printing trade and clerked in a general merchandise store for three or four

Returning to Oregon he bought a hours, but enacted preference law for stock of goods and opened a store in a tent at The Dalles. A little later he Flour going from Scattle to Frisco moved to Auburn, Baker County. He returned to the Willamette valley in 1865 and established the firm of R.
