Weekly Review of Activities Throughout the State.

Six boards and commissions on Higher Education cost for past two years \$14,866.92. The six boards have fifty persons connected with them.

April wheat shipments from Portland 97,673 bushels.

Silverton would improve Church street with concrete.

Bonfou has sold \$14,000 bonds for a new school house.

Forest Grove will improve streets with macadam at \$1.00 to \$1.50 a foot.

Harrisburg—Linn and Lane Counties to build \$60,000 bridge here.

Marshfield—Berry & Nicholson large new furniture store opened.

Whenever made responsible for common carriers jitneys drop out.

Independence—Valley and Siletz railroad will expend \$300,000 on extension.

To supply meters to all Portland water users is to cost \$1,000,000.

Twelve measures on the ballot at Portland city election all more or less calculated to increase cost of government.

Regulations of jitneys proceed along three lines: A monthly license, a surety bond to protect passengers against accidents, and a designated route of travel.

TILLAMOOK COUNTY WILL HAVE ORGANIZED BASE BALL

The following teams were represented and will be included in the new league: Nehalem; Bay City; Tillamook; Redmen; Catholic Academy; Beaver and Cloverdale.

J. R. Callahan was elected temporary president of the league, and F. E. Shaw, secretary. Mr. Callahan appointed the following committee to formulate by-laws and rules for the government of the league, F. E. Shaw, chairman, C. A. Mahan and H. B. Mills.

The first game under the new league regulations will probably be played on decoration day. The schedule for the season will be made up as soon as possible.

R. M. WADE, PIONEER MERCHANT, IS DEAD

From Sunday Journal: R. M. Wade, president of the R. M. Wade & Co., wholesale dealers in implements and vehicles, died at his home, 400 Rodney avenue, at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. He was 80 years old and was one of the pioneer merchants and implement men of Oregon.

Born in Johnson county, Missouri, he came to Oregon with his parents in 1850. They crossed the plains with an ox team. His father took up a donation land claim near where Estacada is now located.

Young Wade lived on the farm three years, until he was 18, and then went to California, where he learned the printing trade and clerked in a general merchandise store for three or four years.

Returning to Oregon he bought a stock of goods and opened a store in a tent at The Dalles. A little later he moved to Auburn, Baker County. He returned to the Willamette valley in 1865 and established the firm of R. M. Wade & Co., implement dealers, at Salem. In 1883 he moved to Portland, and here built up one of the largest implement jobbing houses in the northwest.

He leaves a son, R. L. Wade; two daughters, Mrs. F. May Glafke and Mrs. Edward Newbegin, of Portland; a sister, Mrs. L. E. Marrs, of Salem, and a brother, W. H. H. Wade, of Estacada.

The funeral will be held Tuesday afternoon from the residence. Complete details have not been arranged.

HOMESTEADERS FAIR FOR BLAINE COUNTY

(Bay City Examiner.) Capt. Eadus, a resident of this district, passed away last night. The death was not unexpected, for although Mr. Eadus has been feeling well of late he was considered seriously ill. Early in the morning he sat and talked with his family but a short time afterwards he was stricken suddenly, and expired. Dr. Hawk was able to reach him.

Capt. Eadus was very well known in this district and was one of the fishermen on the bay, he died while fishing in the Wilson cove.

Capt. Eadus was survived by a wife, three children and three daughters. Funerals will be held this afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Bay City cemetery.

SOLDIERS POLICE VICTORIA

Anti German Riots Force Authorities to Take Action.

Victoria, B. C.—Victoria was placed under martial law as the result of attacks upon German establishments by mobs bent upon revenging the sinking of the Lusitania. After a mob of several thousand men and boys had smashed windows in the Phoenix brewery, the New England hotel, Kilburger's jewelry store, Hermann's cleaning establishment and Geiger's plumbing shop, the mayor read the riot act at the corner of Yates and Governor streets and 800 soldiers began patrolling the city.
