## FOR MEXICO ASKED

Red Cross Appeals to Governor of Every State.  
Washington.—Reports of hunger suffering are coming into the Red Cross headquarters all parts of Mexico. Supplemental appeal to the American people. The Red Cross sent a telegram to the governor of every state, which

are a large number of unfortunate people in Mexico facing death starvation, and the president of the United States and the American Red Cross make an appeal for money and supplies. Gifts of corn, beans, and flour will be accepted at any time in the United States and forwarded by the Red Cross to Mexico by the most practicable route to the people in distress. Money may be sent to local Red Cross treasurers or to Red Cross headquarters in Washington. Before doing so, instructions from Washington are furnished for routing.

## ITALIAN KING FIRES CANNON

Monarch Soaked by Rain and Covered by Mud While in Battle.

Geneva.—News dispatches from the Italian front sets forth that King Victor Emmanuel, like King Albert of the Belgians, intends to take an active part in the war.

During the recent attack of the Italian forces on Montebaldo his majesty is described as having taken charge of one of the 75-millimeter guns, and even as firing many shots himself. Subsequently for many hours he watched the operations. It was raining hard at the time, and when the king finally returned to headquarters he was wet through and covered with mud.

A drenching rain has turned the Alpine streams into raging torrents, but fighting between the Italians and Austrians continued with unabated fury. The Italian army of invasion is still sweeping everything before it, and is making wonderful progress at every point in the Tyrol and in Trent.

Italian troops operating in the Adige valley, east of Lake Garda, have passed Ala and have captured Mount Zoppa, dominating Rovereto, etc.

## BERLIN ASKS FIRST TO AGREE ON FACTS

Reply to American Note Defers Main Issue, But Expresses Regret for Injuries.

Berlin, via London.—The German reply to the American note sent after the sinking of the Lusitania, was delivered to Ambassador Gerard Saturday for transmission to Washington.

The note expresses Germany's regret for injuries sustained by Americans as a result of submarine and aeroplane attacks and offers compensation, in cases in which Germany is found to be in the wrong.

It defers a direct answer to the questions raised by President Wilson pending a further exchange of views. Germany desires to establish whether the Lusitania was a defenseless merchant ship or was being used for the transportation of war munitions and soldiers, in which case passengers were permitted to take passage to safeguard the war materials.

The American representations regarding the torpedoing of the British steamer Falaba, in which an American citizen lost his life, are answered with the statement that it was intended to offer ample time for the passengers and crew to leave the ship, but the action of the captain in attempting to escape necessitated more summary action.

Germany expresses regrets for "the unintentional attacks" on the American steamer Cushing and the Gulf Light. The Cushing was attacked by German airmen in the North Sea and the Gulf Light was torpedoed off Scilly Islands.

Germany disavows any intention to attack harmless neutral craft. She offers to pay compensation wherever she is found to be in the wrong and to refer doubtful cases to The Hague for a decision.

The passages in the American note concerning a possible disavowal by Germany of intent to sink the Lusitania and the discontinuance of her present practices of submarine warfare are not mentioned specifically in the reply.

## GERMAN REPLY CAUSE OF DISAPPOINTMENT

Washington.—Germany's reply to the American note concerning the sinking of the Lusitania produced a feeling of profound disappointment here. Dissatisfaction at the failure of Germany to answer the demands of the United States was reflected in government circles generally.

President Wilson determined that the United States must ascertain definitely and promptly from Germany whether the imperial government intends in the future to be guided by the accepted principles of international law and the rights of neutrals or to follow its own rules of maritime warfare.

The questions of fact raised by Germany are regarded as irrelevant at this time. The trend of opinion is that the United States must inquire and obtain an early answer as to whether Germany intends to recognize the hitherto accepted principles that neutrals may travel anywhere on the high seas on unarmed merchant ships, whether or not such vessels carry contraband, and that merchant men which do not resist capture must be visited and searched and the passengers and crew transferred to a place of safety before the vessel is destroyed.

## PRESIDENT WARNS MEXICAN LEADERS

Warring Factions Called Upon to Act Together to Save Their Country.

Washington.—President Wilson, for the government and people of the United States, served warning on the leaders of warring factions in Mexico to "act together promptly for the relief and redemption of their prostrate country" or the United States would be "constrained to decide upon a means to be employed in order to help Mexico to save herself and serve her people."

The president's message to Mexico was short and to the point. First he suggests support of any Mexican leader or group which would have a reasonable chance to pacify the country, but that the determination to end anarchy in Mexico was final was plainly seen in another portion of the statement where it was broadly intimated that American arms, if necessary, would be called into play to save the Mexican people.

President Wilson's statement was addressed to the Mexican people but copies of it will be sent to the leaders of all factions in Mexico for their information and guidance. Officials of the state department will be charged with the duty of its dissemination in Mexico.

The specific course the United States will pursue in the event the contending factions fail to agree is not outlined in the president's statement, but the administration's present purpose is to give moral support to a coalition of the best elements in Mexico and accord the government therewith formal recognition.

## BOTH SIDES ADMIT GALICIAN REVERSE

London.—Some idea of the desperate character of the fighting in central Galicia is given in both the Berlin and Petrograd official reports, each of which uniquely admits reverses suffered at the hands of the other.

The German war office announces that the Russians forced the Teuton near Sienawa back across the San capturing six cannon. The communication adds that 9000 Russians, 25 cannon and 20 machine guns have been captured in the San engagements since May 25.

The Russian war office admits that the Austro-German forces have made further gains on both banks of the San. This communication adds that 7900 Austro-Germans and 17 cannon were captured on the Sienawa and Pizary fronts and that the Teuton fortifications were carried by storm, the Austro-Germans leaving 2000 dead.

Renewed German activity is noted all along the front from the Baltic to the region of Przemyśl.

## BELL TO START ON JULY 5

Historic Treasure Will Be Accompanied on Trip by Party of Fifty.

Philadelphia, Pa.—With the necessary appropriation to pay the expense of the trip now virtually available, the council's committee that will be in charge of the Liberty Bell on the trip to the Panama-Pacific exposition, is preparing for the ceremonies that will attend the departure of the relic from this city.

The bell and the escorting party will leave July 5. The escorting party will include about 60 persons. According to the itinerary arranged, the party with the bell will arrive in San Francisco the night of July 16.

The itinerary for the Pacific coast definitely decided upon is as follows: July 12—Boise and Caldwell, Idaho; Huntington, Baker, La Grande and Pendleton, Or.; Walla Walla, Wash.

July 13—Spokane, Wenatchee and Everett, Wash.

July 15—Portland, Salem, Eugene and Roseburg, Or.

July 16—Marysville, Sacramento, Oakland Pier and San Francisco, Cal.
