Industrial Review Of Oregon

Interesting News Notes About Industries of the State.

Portland—Contracts have been signed up for hard surfacing 66 miles highway, 10 miles concrete and brick, 30 miles of Warrenite bitulithic. Freewater contract let for two new school houses, \$8,300 and \$8,000. Bids opened July 12 for \$200,000 expenditure on Siuslaw jetty. Rammer—A union street improvement to cost \$2,454. Weaton—Marshall hotel to be re-modelled. Bendon to pull down hill and bulk-head water front. Newberg handle factory idle for years is in full operation. Coos Bay lumber shipments leading all Pacific Coast ports. Two railroads announce new work to be started at once, that will mean an expenditure of several millions of dollars. The Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company will build a 10-mile extension to its line recently completed from Riverside westward to Crane Creek Gap. The Southern Pacific announces it will electrically its line between Whitson and Corvallis, a distance of forty-three miles, as an extension of the existing electric unit between Portland and Whitson. Milwaukie—Portland Gas & Coke Co. granted franchise at \$1.25 per 1000 feet. Vale—Potassium nitrate found in excess near here and \$1,000,000 capital to work them. A crab cannery at Empire and fish cannery on Rogue River persist in running in spite of game codes, fish gardens and labor laws. North Bend tries to get water supply in competition with Coos Bay Water Co. S. P. Co. has put on the fast. Exposition special, leaving Portland daily at 12:30 noon. Astoria—Hill steamer Northern Pacific lands 484 passengers and 350 tons freight, largest load since started. Corvallis—Out of 219 graduates, 128 took degrees in agriculture, and 86 in home economics, domestic science and industrial arts. Rest took engineering and pharmacy. Eugene—Siema Ch house to be re-modelled, cost \$2,000. Astoria—Pacific Power and Light Co. will expend \$50,000 to cut out a dangerous trestle and serve more people, if the city gives permission. Yamhill and Tillamook counties will expend \$20,000 on Sour Grass road. Glendale—Reuben sawmill to be operated with 25 men. Eugene—State University will put in printing plant. Albany—Linn County cuts out all but one county school supervisor. Portland—Federation Women's clubs advocates free home for rural school teachers. Eugene factories committee to investigate potato starch industry. Portland—May building permits 1915, \$152,095. For May 1914, \$641,880. Pendleton has selected Johnson & Mayor, Portland Architects for new city library. Marion county will lay 20,000 yards hard surface roads this year. Astoria—Dredge Chinook removed 150,000 tons sand from bar at mouth of Columbia last week.

PORTLAND LETTER.
In competition with exhibits of similar products from other states and a number of foreign countries, Oregon received the gold medal for general excellence of its horticultural display at the Panama-Pacific Exposition at San Francisco a few days ago. This award was made strictly on merit. The jury was composed of 12 men, 7 from the East, two from Japan, two from California and one from Holland. They made a careful detailed inspection of every exhibit in the hall and without hesitation awarded the medal to Oregon.
The display was installed by C. N. Ravin, head of the Oregon Horticultural Society and himself a successful rancher of the Hood River Valley. In arranging the booth, he made no attempt at ornamentation, concentrating his efforts on so arranging the almost faultless collection of fruits, vegetables and other products that the attention of the visitor would be instantly centered on the display and not on its surroundings. Oregon has a right to feel mighty proud of this victory.
Definite and accurate information regarding the climate, resources, products and advantages of Oregon has been made available to all sections of the United States by the presentation by the Portland Chamber of Commerce, of copies of the Oregon Almanac to more than 2,500 prominent public libraries. These copies were sent out within the last few days and at least 800 acknowledgments have already been received. Copies of the almanac have also been sent to the traffic department of all railroads and the resulting correspondence indicates that they will have a marked effect upon the volume of tourist travel in this direction this year.
Gordon Falls, one of the most beautiful of the numerous cataracts in the Columbia gorge, and which is on the line of the new Columbia Highway, has been formally presented to the City of Portland by S. Benson, the capitalist who has for several years been spending his time and money so freely for the improvement of this scenic region. The tract on which the fall is located comprises 380 acres and was purchased two years ago by Mr. Benson for \$21,000.
Thirty-six thousand acres of land in Pine Valley, Baker County, will probably be thrown open for entry within a few weeks if the present plans are carried out. The tract has for several years been tied up under a Carey Act project the promoters of which failed to raise the necessary funds with which to carry it on. The entire tract is favorably located for irrigation.
In order that a channel, not less than sixty feet in width may be established between Tillamook Bay and the docks at Bay City, the Government has ordered the dredge Oregon to Tillamook Bay and the work will be pushed vigorously until completed. It is expected that the dredge will be employed in that vicinity the balance of this season and all of next.

SCHOOL MEETING

There was a fairly good attendance at the school meeting on Monday afternoon and considerable interest was taken.

Attorney H. T. Botts was re-elected director and attorney E. J. Clausson was re-elected clerk.

After the election Mr. Clausson gave his annual report after which other matters were discussed.

Thos. Coates, one of the custodians of the Stillwell Park fund asked for an appropriation for the improvement of the park. This park of 5 acres was given to the children of the city by Baxter Stillwell six years ago with the understanding that a reasonable amount of improvement should be made on the property each year. While some improvements have been made, nothing has been made to beautify the grounds or make much of a showing. This phase of the matter was discussed and it was pointed out that in appreciation of Mr. Stillwell's splendid gift something substantial should be done for the improvement of the grounds, and accordingly \$500 was voted for that purpose.

A motion was made and seconded, asking that the board appropriate enough to try out the Montessori system for the instruction of the little folks between the ages of 3 and 6 years of age. It was thought by many present that as the system was as yet an experiment and somewhat expensive it would not be wise to try it out at this time. The motion was voted down.

The matter of erecting a play shed or gymnasium for the children on the play grounds was also discussed and it was finally decided to appropriate the sum of \$600 for the erection of a play shed where the children could play in rainy weather and be kept out of the wet.
