BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

For the first time since the disease was reported in this state rabies has made its appearance in Polk county.

Conrad Peterson of Silverton and Floyd Day of Yaquina were drowned in the Sluslaw river, above Point Terrace.

The government land office at Vale has allowed homestead applications amounting to upwards of 50,000 acres since January 1.

Portland was awarded the gold medal for the largest number of milk exhibits at the Panama-Pacific International exposition.

The convention of the Oregon State Letter Carriers and the United Association of postoffice clerks will be held Saturday at Salem.

The Union Meat company, of Portland, was the lowest bidder for the beef contract for state institutions for the next six months.

W. W. Johnson, a prominent real estate man of Albany, was found dead in his office with evidence that he had committed suicide.

Taking stamps and premiums are to be abolished in Roseburg by agreement of members of the Roseburg Merchants' Association.

Forty hundred twenty-three students, the largest class in the 32 years of the school's existence, have received diplomas from the Oregon Normal.

The Ladies' Civic Improvement club of Vale has perfected arrangements to hold a "billion" improvement convention at Vale September 1, 2 and 3.

The entire business section of the town of Timber was completely destroyed by fire, entailing a loss of \$12,000, buildings and stocks covered by about \$200,000 insurance.

More than 75 persons attended the 25th annual reunion of the descendants of Lewis and Elizabeth Rinehart held at the first ranch of Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Rinehart, near Salem.

Work is rapidly completing three of its largest buildings, a high school costing \$1,000,000, a state armory costing \$7,000, and an administration building at the university, costing \$500,000.

Two hundred and five deaths of Oregon pioneers were recorded during the year ended June 1, 1915, according to the annual necrology prepared by George H. Himes of the Oregon Historical Society.

Contract for the construction of the terminals for the O. W. R. & N. at The Dalles and Pilot Rock Junction below Pendleton have been let to Twoby Bros. and the work will be started immediately.

Dignitaries of the Catholic church from all parts of eastern Oregon are expected to be in Baker June 23 to take a prominent part in the silver jubilee of Right Rev. C. J. O'Reilly, bishop of eastern Oregon.

The Columbia highway will be open for travel from Portland to The Dalles on or after July 19, according to Roadmaster John Yeon. Until that time it will be necessary to ship automobiles to The Dalles as heretofore.

With nearly every Sunday school class of girls over 15 years of age in the state sending representatives, the third annual girls' conference for the western Oregon body of the State Sunday school association will convene at Salem June 25-27.
