PAVING COMPANY WANTS TO COMPROMISE
On Tuesday evening attorneys for the citizens who brought suit against the Warren Construction Co., met with a large number of the litigants and put before them a proposition which the Warren Construction Co. had made, which was to the effect that the company would reduce the price of the paving 25c per yard on all pavement, waive all interest due on all pavement to date which would amount to \$32,000, and pay the litigants \$25,000 with which they could pay their attorneys and other expenses they had been to. Some of the litigants think this a fair proposition while others feel that the litigants should receive a greater degree of preference over those who would not go into the fight against the company, and in consequence a counter proposal has been made the company. Some of the non-litigants are beginning to take a different view of the situation since the paving company has offered to compromise. Of course should any of the non-litigants be dissatisfied, they have access to the courts to the same extent that the present litigants have had.

WAR MUNITIONS CARGO IS HELD

Hoquiam, Wash.—Driven to port here when she ran short of provisions, the three masted schooner Annie Larson, carrying a cargo of 4999 rifles, bolts and 1,900,000 cartridges loaded with 6mm bullets, is being held here pending investigation by the United States customs department. Although it was suspected in some quarters that the cargo was intended for one of the European belligerents, officials were said to believe that the munitions of war were purchased by leaders of a new Mexican rebellion Victoriano Huerta is alleged to have been planning to launch. The Larson cleared from San Diego for Topolobampo, Mexico, but mystery surrounds the cargo. The captain reports that he was to have transferred the munitions to the Standard Oil tanker Maverick in Mexican waters, but declares that he could not find the Maverick, so returned with the cargo. On the other hand, a report was received a few days ago from the Maverick, which put into Hilo, Sandwich Islands, carrying a cargo of arms and ammunition which the captain said had been transferred from the schooner Annie Larson.

10 AUTOISTS BREAK RECORD

Dario Resta in Auto Makes 97.6 Miles An Hour.
Chicago.—All competitive speedway automobile records of the world from 50 miles to 500 miles were shattered in the first Chicago 500-mile derby. They were not only beaten by Dario Resta, who won with a French car and captured more than \$20,000 in prize money, but by nine other drivers who finished in the money. The previous record, made by Ralph De Palma at Indianapolis recently, was at the rate of 89.84 miles per hour. Resta averaged 97.6 over the same distance and J. Cooper, who finished tenth, bettered the De Palma mark by averaging 96.3 miles. The performance of Jarry Grant in driving the entire race without a stop excited almost as much enthusiasm as the brilliant victory of Resta.

Berlin, via wireless to Sayville, L. I.—The governing board of the Socialist party in a manifesto issued here and passed by the censor, called upon the government, "in the name of humanity and kultur" to begin peace negotiations.
