BEAVERTON TAKES TWO

The biggest event of the celebration, and the one which was enjoyed by all who attended was the baseball games. The fast Beaverton team came out victorious over the local Halton team, by taking two out of the three game series.

Blanchard pitched the Friday game for the locals and won his seventh straight game this season, the score being 10 to 8 in favor of Tillamook. The batteries for Friday game were: Howell and Decker, Blanchard and Heitzman.

The second game was an uneventful session. King was on the mound for the local team and worked in old time form for five innings with the score 3 to 1 against him. In the sixth King weakened and Beaverton started to shout in runs at pleasure. Mills relieved King in the seventh, but was unable to check the onslaught which resulted in a score of 15 to 3 in favor of the visiting team.

The third game was by far the best game of the series. Armbruster was drafted back into service and played a fine game throughout. Blanchard started for the locals and had the Beaverton team eating out of his hand until the fourth inning when he retired on account of a sore arm. Alderman assumed the responsibilities at this time and lasted four innings when he was relieved by King who finished the game. The locals had the game on ice and were on the safe side after Mills, in the seventh inning, lammed out a three bagger with the bases full. In the first of the ninth with two down and two on, Alderman fielded an easy change and made a wild heave at least forty feet over Mills' head and the game was lost 8 to 5.

The batteries for the second game: Van Blaricum and Devo for Beaverton and King, Mills and Heitzman for Tillamook. Third game Howell and Devo for Beaverton and Blanchard, Alderman, King and Armbruster for Tillamook.

The Redmen team lost to Bay City Sunday by a score of 9 to 2.

BAILEY MILL AT WHEELER

BEING COMPLETED.

The work of setting the boilers of the Bailey Mill is practically completed and the work of connecting up the steam pipes and other connections is progressing rapidly. Pipe is expected soon for the pipe line to the East Fork of Zimmerman Creek from which water will be diverted and led to the mill by a 6-inch pipe thus giving ample water and excellent fire protection for the new mill. It is hoped the whistle of the new mill will blow by the 4th of July.

The new plant of the Bailey Mill Co. is modern in every respect and is built in a very substantial way. The company will be able to manufacture lumber on as favorable a basis as any other mill of its size. The new mill makes a very substantial addition to this city and as soon as it operates it will support a payroll which will be an important factor in the development of this community.
