### QUERETARO TAKEN IS REPORT FROM VILLA

Washington.—General Villa telegraphed Enrique C. Lorente, his representative here, that Queretaro, 80 miles north of Mexico City, had been captured by his troops and that the forces of General Obregon, the Carranza commander, were now completely isolated from Vera Cruz.

Restoration of normal conditions in Mexico City by the newly established Carranza authorities is going forward rapidly, according to advices to the state department.

General Carranza, in a message to his Washington agents, telling of the capture of Mexico City, said that he had sent to the capital by special train all the personnel for the departments of the treasury, interior and postoffice, that his government was engaged in sending provisions to the city, and that ample guarantees would be given to everybody.

### SCHOOL-TEACHERS MAY WED

Marriage Found No Bar to Teaching in Oregon.

Portland, Or.—Marriage is not a cause for which a school board in Oregon may remove a permanent teacher from her position. Judge Morrow so held when, after considering the case more than three months he sustained the position of Maude L. Richards in her case against the school board. Mrs. Richards filed an application for a peremptory writ of mandamus forcing the school board to reinstate her as a teacher and to pay her salary from January 4, 1915, the day she was married to Orin R. Richards and discharged by Superintendent Alderman.

Alden J. Blithen, Of Seattle, Dead.  
Seattle, Wash.—Colony Alden J. Blithen, for nearly 20 years editor and publisher of the Seattle Times, died at his home here of a complication of diseases.

Colonel Blithen is survived by two sons, Joseph, business manager of the Times, and Clarence, managing editor; two daughters, Mrs. Thomas Messing and Mrs. Gilbert L. Duffy, and a widow, all residents of Seattle.

Chicago. — Resolutions demanding that all church workers unite to procure a saloonless United States of America, as well as peace among the belligerent nations of Europe, were adopted by the world's Christian Endeavor convention at its final session.
