### DEFINITE PLAN TO PACIFY MEXICO

Washington—A definite step toward settling the Mexican problem will be taken by the United States government in the near future. Authoritative announcement to this effect was made at the state department, although the nature of the contemplated action was not disclosed.

The president's most probable course, it was reported, would be to urge General Carranza for the last time to confer with other faction leaders in an effort to bring about peace. Should Carranza again refuse this plan, it is said efforts will be made to assemble other Mexican leaders who will represent a majority of the Mexican people.

Such a conference, it was suggested, might be held in northern Mexico, if it is possible to free it from military interference. If not, it might be held across the border in the United States.

### Mailman's Bicycle to Go.

Washington—Use of bicycles or motorcycles in the rural delivery service is prohibited by an order issued by Postmaster-General Burleson effective January 1, 1916.

In announcing his order, Mr. Burleson holds that vehicles of these types do not have the carrying capacity needed for the parcel post service and do not afford necessary protection for the mails in bad weather.

### REVOLUTION IN HAITI

**Governor Causing Wholesale Executions Mobs and President Flees.**

Port-au-Prince, Haiti.—A revolution, more terrible in the toll of lives thus far taken than any even in the days of Nord Alexis, flamed out in the Haitian capital. It was an offshoot of the movement to the north, where the adherents of Dr. Rosalvo Bobo, twice expelled from Haiti, have been striking for several months to break the power of the Haitian president, General Vilbrun Guillaume. One hundred and sixty men, including an ex-president of Haiti, General Orestes Zamor, have been executed by order of General Oskar, governor of Port-au-Prince, who later was dragged from the shelter of the Dominican legation and riddled with bullets.

President Guillaume and the members of his family have taken refuge in the French legation, an attack on which is threatened; the presidential palace has been partly destroyed after an attack which lasted for hours, and the revolutionists are in possession of the city.

**President Asks Report on Defense.**

Washington.—Announcement from the White House that President Wilson had directed Secretaries Garrison and Daniels to report to him a program of national defense caused widespread comment.
