BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

J. B. Mason was elected mayor of Klamath Falls.

Ranchers of Grant county are complaining of shortage of help this year. Work has started on the telephone line between Wasco and Maryhill, Wash.

Quest for members for the new commercial club at Klamath Falls resulted in obtaining 75 names.

A special school election at Holly, 15 miles east of Brownsville, authorized a new union high school.

The annual Wasco County Fair and Rodeo will be held in The Dalles from September 28 to October 1, inclusive.

Three of the 156 accidents reported to the state industrial accident commission for the week ending July 29, resulted in fatalities.

G. D. Smith, a Baker fuel dealer, pleaded guilty to using short weights, and was fined the minimum under the new law, \$5 and costs, which he paid.

A special election will be held at Donald in August to place an assessment of 2 per cent on assessed valuation for purposes of carrying on street work.

George Hayes of Pendleton was kicked by a mule and sustained several broken ribs and although seriously injured, it is reported he will recover.

Corporation Commissioner Schulerman gave permission to the Northern Grain & Warehouse company, of Portland, to increase its capital stock from \$100,000 to \$250,000.

George Winters of Corvallis, a graduate of the state normal school at Monmouth, has been elected principal of the schools at Ballston, Polk county, for next year.

Three hundred persons attended the dedication of the Community hall erected at Dundee by the Dundee Woman's club. Dr. C. H. Chapman made the principal address.

Following the circulating of recall petitions against the members of the county court, Waldo F. Finn, roadmaster of Polk county, has filed his resignation with the court.

Thirty-one of the 43 applicants have received state licenses to practice medicine in Oregon, according to information from the Oregon State Board of Medical Examiners.

Joe Brown, who stabbed Eugene Isaacs to death on the Klamath reservation about 50 miles north of that city, recently came to Klamath Falls and surrendered to the police.

Five brothers are members of Leonidas Lodge, No. 55, Knights of Pythias, of Seilo. They are Frank, Row, Arthur, Clifford and John Shelton. All of them reside in or near Seilo.

In addition to securing upwards of 500,000 pounds of wool this season, the Pendleton scouring mill has graded and baled in excess of 3,000,000 pounds which has been shipped in the grease.

A reduction of about 25 per cent in lighting rates of the Eastern Oregon Light & Power company was made by the public service commission of Oregon. The order became effective on August 1.

Ten life and 17 five-year certificates have been issued as a result of the recent semi-annual teachers' examination in Oregon, it was announced by Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill.

A reform of the method of printing monthly county court proceedings has been effected by the county court of Clackamas county and as a result approximately \$75 was saved the first month, according to County Judge Anderson.

A meeting was held in Albany by the fruit growers of that section at which fire blight was the principal subject under discussion. Several prominent speakers were present, among them members of the faculty of O. A. C.

L. J. Simpson of North Bend has announced that he will not be a candidate for the republican nomination for congressman from that district. He had started to make the race, but will withdraw, he says, because of press of business affairs.

Herring by the wagonload have been shoveled up off the tideflats on the Siuslaw during the past week. The school of fish which entered the Siuslaw is said to be the first of its kind in seven or eight years, and is one of the largest, according to old residents.

Plans are being made at The Dalles to build a new road of 25 miles from Ward's Mill, 17 miles southwest of Dufur, to Government Camp. This highway, if built, would shorten the proposed "loop" road around Mount Hood from Portland by 30 miles. At the same time it would afford the tourist a wonderful scenic route, one of the best in this part of the state.

S. Benson, Portland philanthropist and millionaire lumberman gave \$100,000 to School District No. 1 for the purpose of building the first unit of the trades school building on the site recently purchased in East Portland. The only restriction attached to the gift is the condition that the school district contract to spend an equal amount during the year 1916 in the construction of the second unit of the same building.
