Red Men Banquet At Hotel Tillamook

An Evening of Feasting and Speech Making

On Tuesday evening a banquet was given in honor of the visiting Red Men at the Hotel Tillamook. Two long tables extending the full length of the dining room were covered, nearly two hundred being present. The dining room was appropriately decorated as the evening was first class. Tillamook is indeed fortunate in having such accommodations.

After the feast was over, Dr. E. E. Daniels acting as toastmaster, introduced him, S. S. Johnson, who gave the address of welcome in behalf of the city. Attorney Johnson in his usual fluent style gave a short talk of our little city situated as it is among the most beautiful surroundings, and asked our visitors to enjoy these things to the full during their stay with us. Judge Jones in response spoke of the bright future of Tillamook. His glowing picture pleased our people very much.

The next speaker introduced was the Great Injunnee Frederick O. Downes of Boston. Mr. Downes made the address of the evening which was a masterly effort. Laying aside all jesting, he entered into the solid substance of the work to which he is greatly devoted. The history aims and purposes of the order were given due consideration and he gave the members of the order who were present much food for thought, cause for encouragement and enthusiasm for the future welfare of the order.

Great Sachem Cue who was then introduced made a short address fitting to the occasion.

Toastmaster Daniels, next introduced F. E. Shaw of this city, who in behalf of the local Katawa tribe, gave the visitor a royal welcome. Mr. Shaw's remarks were well chosen and to the point and voiced the sentiments of every member of the local tribe of this city.

L. M. Leifer of Portland, gave the response to Mr. Shaw's address, giving a splendid talk which was full of wit, humor and also some of the more solid things which are profitable to think upon.

The above mentioned addresses were followed by several short and appropriate talks.

On Wednesday morning the visiting delegates were taken in autos about the country. Wednesday afternoon was spent in a business session, and on Wednesday evening the degree work of the lodge was exemplified to a large class.

Crack bowlers among the visiting Red Men undertook to "show up" the local pinshooters at Casey and Fitzpatrick's Bowling and Billiard Parlors on Tuesday night. Several months before the conclave opened, challenges were issued to the local aggregation and many followers of the sport were on hand to witness the slaughter.

Five men participated in each team, the "Braves" being represented by Kenyon, Hanning, Stackhouse, Ferguson and Dickie, and the community by Goldworthy, Wallace Myers, Watkins and Fitzpatrick. Three games were scheduled to be played, but after the second, the visitors admitted their defeat and withdrew. The local team averaged 169 2-10 pins while the visitors found only 133 4-10.
