The general exhibit building will be occupied by several of our merchants who will have displays and by individual and general displays.

The new stock building will house 100 head of stock and is under the supervision of Dr. J. E. Reedy.

The fair grounds have been nicely cleared off and there is plenty of room for stock and other necessary exhibits. The fair board is to be congratulated upon the splendid condition everything is in. From the little agricultural show held in the streets of our city two years ago, our fair has grown to be as extensive and as well equipped as any in the state.
