Those of our farmers and, especially the Grangers and schools who brought their exhibits from great distances to the fair, should be especially commended for the splendid efforts which they have made. We are sure that everyone interested in the fair appreciates their efforts.

The Standard Oil Co. is seeking to secure from the city a franchise for the purpose of erecting in this city a tank and warehouse from which will be distributed all kinds of oils. The tank as erected here will be a distributing point for Tillamook City and all parts of the county. There seems to be a hitch in the proceedings, however, because of the fact that the site selected by the company is rather close to some of our industries. For instance the Feeney Bremer Co. whose property lies adjacent to that selected by the Standard people, is objecting to the erection of an oil tank near their 100 feet of their buildings, because of the raise in insurance rates and increase in the fire hazard. The underwriters claim that the tank must not be nearer than 100 feet to other buildings and that it must be surrounded by a deep trench and other restrictions must be lived up to, otherwise the insurance of the surrounding buildings will be raised. The Feeney Bremer Co. does not feel that it can stand to have its fire hazard increased. This company has about \$5,000 invested, and sometimes has additional machinery under repair amounting to two and three thousand. One fire would wipe out everything they have. As this institution employs from six to twelve men all the time, it has a nav roll that should be considered and the council should see that it is protected. Surely there is room enough on Hogwarton slough within our city limits, where the Standard people can build without jeopardizing anyone's interest.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

The deer season opened Sunday, August 15, and closes October 15.
James Fisher, 33 years old, veteran of the Civil War, died after an illness of several days at his home in Salem.
Governor Withcomb will attend the "banquet day" celebration at the Pacific-Pacific fair as a private citizen.
Lot Livermore, first mayor of Pendleton and pioneer of Umatilla county, celebrated his eightieth birthday last week.
The contractors bids for the \$110,000 schoolhouse at Clatskanie, Ore., have been received, and having been accepted.
Judge H. B. the new assistant clerk of the court at Clatskanie, Ore., has arrived from Toledo, O., after a long trip.
The articles of incorporation of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, Clatskanie, Ore., were filed with County Clerk Harrington.
Mrs. Homer Phillips of White Salmon died at a hospital in McMinnville from burns sustained when gasoline used as a lamp exploded.
Articles of incorporation of the First National bank of Donald having a capitalization of \$15,000, were filed with the state superintendent of banks.
Miss Zelma Monroe, of the Illinois Wesleyan University, has been chosen to take charge of the department of home economics at Pacific University.
Two fatal and 177 other accidents in Oregon industries were reported to the state industrial accident commission during the week ending August 21.

Three billion feet of timber has been contracted for by the Thomas Pulp & Paper company for use in the main factory of paper in the proposed paper mill in Albany.

Charles H. Hancock, graduate of engineering at the U. S. A. has been appointed to a position in the United States engineering service, with headquarters at Fargo, N. D.

Mr. J. H. May, of Lexington, Or., became a bankrupt for the month time at the age of 45, which was marked in Albany to J. H. Ward, of Mill City. Mr. Ward is 49.

Nine thousand men at La Grande were arrested when the police department confiscated its campaign on automobile owners for not having tail lights on their automobiles.

It is estimated that hunters will be less numerous in the southern Oregon mountains this year than usual, owing to the attraction of the Panama exposition, and to other causes.

The city of Forest Grove paid John Williams \$100 as damages for an injury he received several months ago, while in its employ. He was struck by a falling telephone pole and confined to bed for over three months.

A trust of consideration \$10,000, which was given to the Commercial Trust & Savings bank of Tillamook and covering timber lands in Marion and Clackamas counties, was filed with the Marion county recorder.

Twelve days, almost to the hour, after her husband, William Russell, farmer mining man, died at his home at Tillamook, his widow, Susan F. Russell, one of the best known early residents in this vicinity, passed away at the age of 80. She had been ill with dropsy.

Colonel James Jackson, of Portland, United States army, retired, and in command of the Oregon National Guard, refused to prosecute Harry Hanson, driver of the automobile that ran into and injured him last week. Colonel Jackson is thought to be in danger of serious hurt from the accident.

Commander Percy N. Olmstead, of the gun at Nashville, who is taking charge of the United States fleet in setting the mines in Haiti, and who extended the zone of United States control over all of Cape Haitien, was born in Tillamook, Ore., in 1861. He was at one time circuit judge at Clatskanie, when the circuit included Grant, Baker and other counties.

One of the most unique conclaves ever held was a fraternal organization of great Wednesday when members of the Fraternity of Pythias gathered at Clatskanie, Ore., for a social gathering. DEFENSE MEASURES URGED BY MR. TAFT

Portland, Or.—Ex-President Taft, who visited Portland to attend a joint meeting of the Oregon and Washington state bar associations, was entertained by the local bar club at a luncheon and in an address for the first time since he left the White House gave his views on the question of protecting the nation against possible foreign aggression. He did not mince words. He pointed out flat-footed and straight forwardly in an earnest appeal for bigger navy, an increased system of coast defenses and a larger and more mobile standing army. "There are two possibilities," said, "that are requiring that the nation show its strength." He referred to the European situation and it was obvious that the other possibility he had spoken of was the situation in Mexico.

"We read," he continued, "of a great European war, and the necessity of the struggle appeals to us."

"It ought to take us away from our feeling of contentment. We ought to be grateful to the Providence that we are exempted from the present conflict, that should blind us to the necessity of our taking early action, so that we do not find ourselves in a similar position if an aggressor shall war us."

RAISE IN RATES ALLOWED

Petition of Express Companies Granted in Two States
Salem, Or.—Qualified advocates from 1 to 5 cents in package rates for interstate shipments weighing more than 100 pounds, as proposed in a bill filed with the public service commissions of Oregon and Washington, express companies operating in the two states, were granted by the commissions following a contest. The advances will be effective September 12.

The new rates on interstate express business, which are made on the basis as were allowed recently by interstate commerce commission, interstate business, and effective September 1, are an increase of 25 percent in the two states. The two commissions announced that the advances allowed do not include merchandise shipments weighing 100 pounds or more, or contract rates.
