### BRIEF WAR NEWS

Germany and England have both placed orders for munitions with Swiss factories.

The British reinforced their Gallipoli army during the past week and made slight advance inland from Suvla bay.

Italian troops captured an important Austrian redoubt near Mount Masson in the Trentino region, Genoa California reported.

Cotton was officially declared absolute contraband of war by the British government.

Spain has protested to Germany against the sinking of two Spanish steamers recently torpedoed by submarine.

Bombardment of the outskirts Constantine by a Russian aeroplane squadron resulting in the death or injury of 41 persons, is announced as a dispute from Athens.

The destruction of the British armada Feb. 12 in Danish territory by German destroyers under cover of smoke which caused the ships to go under Danish protection is followed widespread indignation while other expression in the Danish newspapers.

The Russian armies are continuing their retreat under the persistent pressure of the Austria-Germans. The report from German army headquarters tell of the capture of Bielsk on the Breslau-Lublinostol line, by General von Galitzin troops, and the driving of the Russians south of the line over the Biala River. The Russians made a stand before the advances of the army of Prince Leopold of Bavaria, but broke under the German attack and continued their retreat Berlin announced.

### Russians Lose Ossowetz.

Berlin, via London—German troops have occupied the fortress of Ossowetz, which was evacuated by the Russians. German army headquarters announced.

In the most remarkable exhibition of rifle shooting ever given Mrs. Topperwein shot ten sets of 100 2½ inch targets thrown into the air by an assistant, missing only one out of the entire set. During the shooting she made straight runs of targets taken 1000, 1200 and 1400 ft. She used two Winchester automatic rifles and Winchester cartridges, and the loading of the rifles was done by herself. Considering the almost incredible score and the tremendous strain of such incessant shooting, it is unlikely that this record will ever be beaten.

Other remarkable feats by Mrs. Topperwein with the rifles were her scoring of 88 out of 100 2½ inch targets thrown into the air while riding at full speed in an automobile; and the breaking of 1500 targets without a miss at the World's Fair at St. Louis.

### JOHN LELAND HENDERSON

Pacific Coast and Samuda. On the first day of the tournament, she made the remarkable score of 195 out of 200, which included twenty doubles, and on the final day she broke the entire program of 100 singles straight. During the year 1913 Mrs. Topperwein shot 10,000 targets, scoring over 95 per cent. She made straight runs of 100 nine times and one run of 162. Shooting for the Denver Post Trophy in a Eastern Handicap she outshot the field of over 250 shooters by scoring 48 out of 100 1000 1200 yards, and closing her season's work at the State Fair in Phoenix, Ariz., she scored 141 in the three day's shooting the magnificent total of 307 of 300 targets, and in a special handicap event, standing at the 23 yard mark, she broke 93 targets out of 100. Mrs. Topperwein is the only lady in the world who ever had the honor to finish as a national marksman in open competition, shooting at 200, 300 and 300 yards with a military rifle.




