BRIEF WAR NEWS

Germany and England have both placed orders for munitions with Swiss factories.

The British reinforced their Gallipoli army during the past week and made slight advance inland from Bulva Bay.

Italian troops captured an important Austrian redoubt near Monte Mairino in the Trentino region, General Cadorna reported.

Cotton was officially declared absolute contraband of war by the British government.

Spain has protested to Germany against the sinking of two Spanish steamers recently torpedoed by submarines.

Bombardment of the outskirts of Constantinople by a Russian aeroplane squadron, resulting in the death or injury of 41 persons, is announced in a dispatch from Athens.

The destruction of the British submarine E-12 in Danish territory by German destroyers, under enemy charges which placed the ship's crew and cargo under Danish protection, has aroused widespread indignation which finds expression in the Danish news papers.

The Russian armies are continuing their retreat under the persistent pressure of the Austro-Germans. The report from German army headquarters, told of the capture of Brestok on the Brest-Litovsk-Bialystok line, by General von Gallwitz' troops, and the driving of the Russians south of Bialystok over the Biala River. The Russians made a stand before the advance of the army of Prince Leopold of Bavaria, but broke under the German attack and continued their retreat to Berlin announced.

Russians Lose Ossowetz.
Berlin, via London.—German troops have occupied the fortress of Ossowetz, which was evacuated by the Russians. German army headquarters has announced.

Wilson Sentence is Stayed by Court.
St. Paul, Minn.—

Wilson in America won two victories in the legal war which has succeeded the strike of Colorado miners. The state supreme court granted a writ of habeas corpus, preliminary to the case of the John R. Lawson case, and at the same time barred Judge Grady Hillyer from presiding at future trials growing out of strike disorders.
