RUSSIAN GRAND DUKE DEPOSED BY CZAR

Former Commander-in-Chief Is Punished to Unimportant Post in Caucasus.

Petrograd, via London—Grand Duke Nicholas has been transferred to the Caucasus by Emperor Nicholas.

The emperor took this action on assuming command of the military and naval forces of Russia.

In transferring the grand duke he appointed him viceroy of the Caucasus and commander-in-chief of the army in the southern front.

London—Grand Duke Nicholas issued an order to "the valiant army and fleet," thanking them for their heroism in the past. He predicts that with the emperor leading them, they will perform fresh exploits.

The text of the czar's order is quoted as follows: "Today I have taken supreme command of all my forces of the sea and of the land armies operating in the theater of war.

"With firm faith in the clemency of God, and with unshaken assurances of final victory we shall fulfill our sacred duty to defend our country to the last. We shall not dishonor the Russian land."

The action of Emperor Nicholas in transferring his cousin, the Grand Duke Nicholas, to the Caucasian front, is perhaps the most important change of this nature which has been made by any of the belligerent nations.

The post to which Grand Duke Nicholas has been transferred is of relative unimportance as compared with the prestige and vast powers of his former office as commander-in-chief of all Russia's great fighting forces.

BRITISH PASSENGER LINER TORPEDOED

Queenstown.—Six second-cabin passengers, six third-cabin passengers and 13 of the crew of the steamer Hesperian, torpedoed 150 miles off Queenstown Saturday evening, were unaccounted for, according to the revised official figures issued by the Allan line. This brings the probable death list, including Miss Carberry, of St. Johns, N. E., whose body is here, up to 26.

No submarine was seen and probably it was too dark to observe the wake of a torpedo, but all the passengers and members of the crew who arrived at Queenstown in the rescue steamers agree that the attack was made by a German undersea boat, basing their opinion on the force of the shock and the great volume of water thrown into the air.

It has been established that an American named Wolff, an able seaman, was lost on the Hesperian. He came from Newark, N. J., and was of Dutch parentage.

There is absolutely no doubt that a gun was mounted on the Hesperian. It is understood the gun was visible and no secret made of its presence.

Berlin Makes Denial. Berlin, via London.—Persons in a position to speak with authority, assert positively the conviction that the steamship Hesperian was not torpedoed by a German submarine, at least, under the conditions thus far described.

"DROP IN AND LOOK AROUND"

MARTIAL LAW IS DECLARED IN HAITI

Washington.—Foreign influences in Haiti working to block plans of the United States to pacify the republic and rehabilitate its finances under American supervision have made it necessary to declare martial law in Port au Prince, the capital, and practically all but two of the country's open ports.

Rear-Admiral Caperton, acting with in his general instructions, declared martial law and explained that his action was taken because of a situation which was beyond the control of the local government.

For reasons of international policy the state department will not disclose any of the information it has received bearing on the subject. There have recently been persistent reports of the activity of foreign agents, and so marked has been the effect of their activities upon members of the Haitian congress and government that the state department found it necessary to hurry its policy of educating the people of Haiti to an appreciation of the benefits of American financial control, with its protection against insistent foreign creditors.

MORTAR RECORD IS MADE

Fort Stevens Mortars Smash Moving Target at 13,400 Yards.

Fort Stevens, Or.—Firing at the extreme range of 13,400 yards, a mortar battery here demolished a pyramidal target, 10 by 10 feet at the base, with the fourth salvo of two shots. The fifth salvo was fired in such rapid succession that the projectiles were on the way while broken pieces of the target were in the air, and the shells fell with a splash among the floating remnants, counting as another hit on the score.

This record is remarkable in mortar practice and is the first time in the history of the United States army that such results have been attained. At the range used the target is invisible to the eye excepting with the aid of powerful telescopic instruments.

WILSON TO ASCERTAIN IF PEACE IS DESIRED

Ambassadors to Find Out if Belligerent Nations Want America to Mediate.

Washington.—President Wilson took the first step to ascertain whether a formal offer of mediation by the United States government would be welcomed by the European belligerents.

The state department sent a cable message to Ambassador Page at London to report the opinion of the reception that would be accorded by Great Britain in a mediation proposal by the president.

A similar cable message was dispatched to Ambassador Gerard at Berlin. The understanding in official circles is that the same inquiry will be addressed to the American ambassadors at Petrograd, Paris, Rome, and Constantinople.

Officially it was denied that the president has agreed upon the suggestion of Pope Benedict that he undertake the task of bringing about peace in Europe at this time. Officially this is the fact, for the president does not purpose to proffer his good offices unless one or more of the belligerents should give him unquestionable reason to believe that his services as mediator are desired.

Unless one or more of the warring nations is ready to propose peace and desires to make the United States government the channel of the overtures, it is probable that no publicity will be given the results of the inquiries directed to American ambassadors abroad.

Army Takes Full Charge on Border. Brownsville, Tex.—The United States army has taken the most important step it has yet made in the border complications of the lower Rio Grande valley when an order was issued here giving to army officers command over the actions of the civilians on the river bank in case shooting across the international boundary is subscribed.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

Women Jailed on Forgery Charge. Baker.—What is believed to be the beginning of the round-up of a ring of women forgers was started here when Mrs. M. J. Collins, Julia Moore and Blanche Wilson were arrested and Portland police were instructed by telegraph to arrest Leota Yates, who went to that city not long ago. Already claims for more than \$700 have been presented to the county officials and there is a possibility that more will be unearthed. Frank Pollitt, a prominent citizen of Baker, is said to have declared that more than this amount was obtained from him.

Alaska Salmon Pack Reduced. Portland.—With the arrival here in tow from Astoria of the Alaska salmon bark Levi G. Burgess the bulk of the salmon pack made by the Portland companies in the north this year has been accounted for. The Burgess and the ship Berlin, which followed her by a few days, sailed with an aggregate of 22,250 cases, or fifteen hundred less than they brought last year. Cannermen who came down with the vessels estimated that the Alaska pack as a whole would be 40 per cent under that of last year.

Medford Pears Bring High Price. Medford.—Medford pears thus far this season have secured the highest market prices in the east, according to S. V. Beckwith, manager of the Rogue River Fruit and Produce association. All the pears have been sold through the Northwestern Fruit Exchange. Encklets have averaged from \$1.10 to \$1.35 per box and Howells from \$1.25 to \$2.25 per box. These prices are all f. o. b. Medford and far exceed the average prices paid for California and Washington fruit.
