LIVING WAGE LAW PROPOSAL IS KILLED

Albany, N. Y.—New York's constitutional convention closed consideration of all proposed amendments amid exciting scenes.

While friends and foes of the proposal to permit the legislature to enact a living wage law for women and children clamored for a vote on the measure, President Ellhu Root, on the motion of Majority Leader Wickersham, declared the convention adjourned for the week. This week consideration will be given only to work of the revision committee.

The chief proposed amendments would provide for: Shortening of the ballot so as to make the governor, lieutenant-governor, attorney-general and comptroller the only elective state officers.

An executive budget system, whereby the legislature might eliminate items from the budget of the governor, but make no additions.

Votes for women. The convention merely provided that if the proposed suffrage amendment already passed by two legislatures is approved at the referendum this fall it shall become operative.

Raising the annual salary of the governor from \$10,000 to \$20,000 a year and the salaries of legislators from \$1500 to \$2500 and railroad fare from their homes to Albany.

CASHIER LOCKED IN VAULT

Selah, Wash., Bank Robbed in Daylight by Masked Pair.

North Yakima, Wash.—Two masked men held up the Selah state bank at 4 o'clock in the afternoon, obtaining \$1350 in currency and silver, locked Cashier Elmer Dahlin in the vault and made their escape in an automobile. The robbers entered the bank at 4 p. m., held up Cashier Elmer Dahlin, drew the shades, rifled the tills and vault, forced Dahlin to give them a sack in which to carry off the loot, then locked him in the vault and made their escape.

Chief of Police McCurdy and Detective Lilly found at the side of the roadway near the state fair grounds the Ford car of William Meloy, in which, officers are certain, the two bank bandits made the trip from this city to the town of Selah, four miles distant. It is now believed that the robbers are still hiding in the city and that they returned here before the officers responded to the delayed call for assistance.

Utah Federal Judge Resigns. Washington.—The resignation of John A. Marshall as United States district judge for Utah was received at the department of justice here. Judge Marshall gave no reason for resigning.

Five Children Die in Flames. San Francisco.—Five little girls perished in a fire which destroyed the St. Francis Girls' Directory Orphan asylum.
