German forces that have been engaged in battle with the Russians in the district north of the Bieloviezh forest, have captured the city of Wolkowysk.

Aviator Adolph Pegoud was killed in action. He fell 6900 feet. Pegoud was the first aviator in the world to "loop the loop" in an aeroplane and was regarded as the greatest aviator of France.

It is declared the Russians already are nearly, if not quite, holding their own against the Austrians and Germans, whose advance at most points has been stopped, and in places are on the offensive.

Fifteen hundred and fifty men, 1250 of whom were British soldiers and the others members of the crew, were lost on a British transport which has been sunk by a mine off the entrance to the Dardanelles.

Teutonic pursuit of the Russians is continuing in the Bieloviezh forest region and the marshes east of Brest-Litovsk. Field Marshal von Mackensen's forces have worked to within less than 40 miles of Pinsk.

The news that Emperor Nicholas had placed himself at the head of his army, which he announced in a telegram to Raymond Poincare, president of France, and the visit paid by the French commander-in-chief, General Joffre, to the Italian army, fore-shadow, it is believed, stirring events on both the eastern and western fronts, in which the armies of all the allies will co-operate.

President Wilson is expected to take up Secretary Garrison's plans for re-organization of the army immediately.

The army camp wiped out in Texas City by the recent flood will not be reestablished, Secretary of War Garrison has announced.

The Cobb county, Georgia, grand jury reported that it had been unable to find enough evidence, after a two days' examination of witnesses, to indict any one for the lynching of Leo M. Frank.

Under the direction of Charles M. Schwab, president of the Bethlehem Steel corporation, American war plants are to put the government of China on a basis of military and naval preparedness.

Governor Johnson of California has issued a proclamation lifting the quarantine against cattle being shipped into California from many states. The quarantine was laid when the foot-and-mouth disease raged.

Substantial reduction in the west-bound transcontinental freight rates will become effective October 18 under the new tariffs filed with the interstate commerce commission by all the carriers comprising the transcontinental freight bureau, which includes all the lines terminating in the northwest.

Hundreds imperiled in Kansas Floods

Fort Scott, Kan.—Water from the Marmaton river, which rose 30 feet in a few hours, flooding wholesale and residence sections of Fort Scott and imperiling the lives of hundreds of persons, has receded, and fears of loss of life and further property damage has passed.

Iola, Kan.—Eight of the 12 persons reported missing were taken unharmed from the flood caused by the cloud-burst, during which six inches of rain fell.
