JACOB BLUM DEAD

Jacob Blum who has been ailing for some time with dropsy at the home of his son at Pleasant Valley, died on Wednesday night. The funeral services will be held today at the U. B. church, Tillamook under the auspices of the G. A. R., which order he was a member of. Interment took place at the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Obituary.

Jacob Blum was born in Switzerland the seventh day of April 1834. Came to America to Newglars, Wisconsin, in 1845; was married to Elizabeth Babler in 1861. Served in the 9th Wisconsin Regiment two years. Came to Oregon in 1877. Spent the last 28 years in Tillamook County. He leaves a widow and twelve children, 53 grandchildren and 15 great grandchildren. The children are Mrs. M. E. Graf, Mrs. Lydia Mills, Mrs. Doratha Detje of Portland, Mrs. Esther Franklin, Salt Lake, Utah, and Edd Ame, Chas. John, Fred Alwin, Mrs. Anna Simmons, and Martha Simmons all of Tillamook Co.

Mr. Blum was brought up in the Evangelical Church. After he came to Tillamook he united with the Methodist Church. After moving to Pleasant Valley he was one of the first members of the United Brethren class organized there, and was deserving of more credit than any one in the neighborhood in getting the church erected there. He was a faithful Christian to the last. He will be greatly missed as he was one of the oldest citizens in the neighborhood. His last and really only sickness was due to old age and a general breakdown which he bore with great patience.

He died at his home in Pleasant Valley Sept. 30 1915.
