THE CHILDREN'S PARK.

Thomas Gilford Stillwell Agrees to Accept the City's Proposition.

Thomas Gilford Stillwell, deeded 4% acres of land within the city limits, for a children's park and play ground, having brought suit to recover the land, accepted the City's offer to deed one acre of the land to the city on condition that he be allowed to take judgment against the This was mutually agreed upon by Stillwell's attorneys, S. S. Johnson and T. B. Handley, and City Attorney H. T. Botts, the following stipulation having been placed on file w the suit pending in the Circuit Court:

It is stipulated and agreed that the plaintiffs have a decree on condition that the defendant Tillamook City shall be compensated for money exended by it on the property, plaintiff agreed to convey to Tillamook City an acre of the land, beginning at a point 17.67 chains south and 2.65 chains west of the southeast corner of Block No. 6 in W. D. Stillwell's in an attempt to bring their long reddition to the town of Lincoln (now within the incorporate limits of Tillamook City, Ore.), and running thence thence east 135 fort; thence south south 123 2-4 feet to the place of beginning, and that immediately upon the entry of the decree Thomas Gilford Stillwell shall convey this property to the city by a good and sufficient war ranty deed, free and clear of all incumbrances, and without any restrictions whatsoever.

BRUEF WAR NEWS

Greece answered the Bulgarian call to arms by ordering general mobilization of her land forces.

Germany's third war loan was oversubscribed \$507,000,000, according to official announcement. Ten billion marks (about \$3,500,000,000) was ask ed. Subscriptions totaled \$3,007,500,

The Italian official communication records the repulse of Austrian at tacks at various points and declares that in the region of the Danoa and Giudicaria valleys the Italians by a surprise attack succeeded to densoi ishing part of the Austrian trenches.

All the way from the Baltic port of Rica to the Pripet marshes the Ruy eians are holding their line stubbornly tirement to an end. The fighting is particularly severe southeast of Vilos and east of Dyinsk. Envelopment of the Vilna army having falled, it is assuzzed the Germans will develop their offensive movement at Dvinsk, with the view of an ultimate blow at Rign.

American vessels carrying conditional contraband of war hereafter under no circumstances will be sunk by Germans, nor will American merchantmen carrying absolute contraband of war be sent to the bottom except in cases of extreme necessity. These promises are made to the United States in a new note from Germany concerning the sinking of the ship William P. Frye.

That the long-expected "drive" by the Anglo-French ailies on the western front has begun is indicated by dispatches from London, Paris and Berlin. The Paris report says that gains have been made. 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
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
