A move is on foot to extend the construction of the Sour Grass road down the Little Nestucca River. We do not believe there is a more commendable road project in the county than the one above mentioned. A good road down the Little Nestucca will accommodate a large number of people in the south end of the county and will open up a fine country.

Lumber prices are on the up trend. Puget Sound mill owners have raised the price from \$1.00 to \$1.50 on fir, and Portland lumber men have raised it another 50c per thousand. We understand that a growing demand for building material in the central states and the European demand are the chief causes for the raise. The resumption of lumbering activities means much for the northwest and will give us a share of the prosperity now enjoyed by the east.

"The blow that almost killed father," struck Bro. Baker this week when lumber advanced from \$1.00 to \$2.00 per thousand and cheese went up another cent per pound accompanied by the announcement that it would soon go higher. Bro. Baker's long drawn out lament over the depression of the cheese market this summer, which he claims was caused by Canadian and other foreign shipments allowed by the tariff policy of the Democrats, would be amusing if it did not make a public exhibition of the abnormal condition of his brain which indeed must be in the last stages of the softening period, for instead of Canada and New Zealand shipping butter and cheese to us, as Bro. Baker would have us believe, we have been shipping large quantities to those countries. By the time you lose another postoffice, Bro. Baker, you will be a fit candidate for the lunatic asylum.

CHEESE MARKET IS FIRMER AND HIGHER; ANOTHER RISE IS DUE

From Journal:
Market for cheese is firmer and higher and a further advance in the price is expected to be made by the Tillamook association today. The great strength in the cheese market here at the present time is due to most extent to the extreme prices ruling in the east, making the local price even at the advance somewhat lower than quotations of other markets at comparative points. Tillamook was quoting 1c higher than last week with flats 1 1/4c f. o. b. the Cheese City.

The great weakness which so characterized the cheese trade during the early part of the season and well as through the summer months, has entirely disappeared, leaving in its place a tone of much strength.
For months there was no speculative activity at all in the cheese trade and this was probably the cause for the extreme weakness and slowness of the coast markets. With Canada buying cheese in the United States due to the war orders at home, the Atlantic seaboard has been quoting an unusually strong tone.

As a general rule the Tillamook price is set at such a height that it is just low enough to stop eastern shipments coming in any great quantity to the coast, but this season the price here has been somewhat lower than the eastern price, not even considering the added freight charge.

DEPARTMENT OF LABOR ANNOUNCEMENT

Distribution Branch, Portland, Oregon, Oct. 6, 1915.—The United States Department of Labor, through its local branch at Portland, Oregon, again

directs the attention of the public to the fact that it maintains a Division of Information for the benefit of employers of labor seeking help and for the assistance of workers seeking employment.

While this service is entirely free and available to all in both city and country, the Government realizes that it is the employer situated outside the larger cities and towns who is handicapped in securing competent help because of his remoteness from the ordinary labor markets. Therefore it is particularly to such, comprising farmers, ranchers, orchardists, stockmen, cannery and manufacturers, that the Government tenders its free service. Employers can be put in prompt touch with skilled or unskilled help of almost any race or nationality and for any kind of work including domestic service.

Every Postmaster is an authorized agent for the Government's Employment Branch and will receive applications from employer or unemployed. Or such applications and requests for information may be sent to the District Headquarters under the following address:

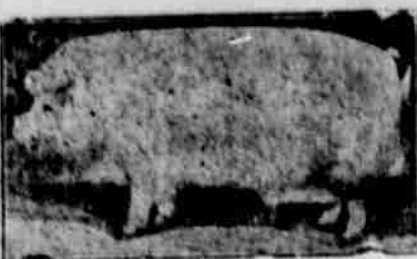
PHILOSOPHERS ARE HUMORISTS

WESTERN STATES ROCKED BY QUAKE

Shock Is Felt Over Area Extending Throughout Six States.

Baker, Or.—Baker was shaken by distinct earthquake shock at 10 o'clock Saturday night. It lasted a minute.

The shock was widely felt, but damage was minimal. Plaster on walls and ceilings of the Columbia hotel was cracked and minor break were reported at other places. There were also many reports of dishes being shaken from tables and cups falling.

A distinct earthquake shock last nearly two minutes occurred at 10:15 at two minutes of 12, morning time. There was no sudden stop but the earth seemed to roll like waves. The movement seemed to come from north to south.

Quake Felt Over California

San Francisco.—Sharp earthquake shocks were felt at 10:14 Saturday night at points in Utah, Nevada, California. Throughout the north part of California two distinct shocks occurred in rapid succession, period of vibration being from 15 to 20 seconds.

So far as known no damage caused.

Shock Is Felt in Seattle

Seattle.—Professor E. J. Mott who has charge of the seismograph room at the University of Washington says the seismograph record at university showed that the earthquake was one of the most pronounced disturbances of recent years.

Buildings Sway in Boise

Boise, Idaho.—Boise and portion of Idaho experienced three distinct earthquake shocks at 11:15 Sunday night. Shocks were slight and there was a perceptible sway of buildings. So far as can be ascertained no damage was done.

Reports from all parts of Idaho and eastern Oregon indicate that although the earthquake was severe, no serious damage was done.

ADMITTED ATTACK ARABIC UNJUSTIFIED

Washington.—Material given by the negotiations for settlement of maritime controversy between United States and Germany reflected at a conference by Count von Bernstorff and Secretary of State Lansing.

Count von Bernstorff, German Secretary of State, in a statement to the Arabic press, which is absolutely devoid of the slightest hint and accepts the position of United States that attack should have been made and was justified on the grounds of self defense alleged by Germany.

Germany's disclaimer of responsibility for the sinking of the Arabic accompanying assurances that a possibility of another such incident has been precluded through strict instructions to submarine commanders was regarded by officials of the government as one of the most favorable results secured by American policy since the European war.

APPLE SALES TO BE STOPPED

Distribution is to Be Watched Northwest.

Washington.—Complying with numerous requests from the courts, chambers of commerce, and shippers' organizations of Washington, Oregon, and Montana, the office of the States department of agriculture made plans to establish headquarters in the northwest study of the distribution of boxed apple crop.

The work which the office is not that of a telegraphic market service, but rather contemplation collection by mail and the use of data and issuance of weekly news concerning the shipment destination of the northwest apples.

Minneapolis Votes to Retain Minneapolis.—Minneapolis retained the honor of becoming east dry city in America. By a vote of 8950, Hennepin county, Minneapolis is the principal feasted local option. The vote was 66,000, or 14,000 more than in an election in the past.

Arizona Militia Ordered to Phoenix, Ariz.—Arizona militia ordered to proceed to Phoenix where the mine strike has caused disorder.
