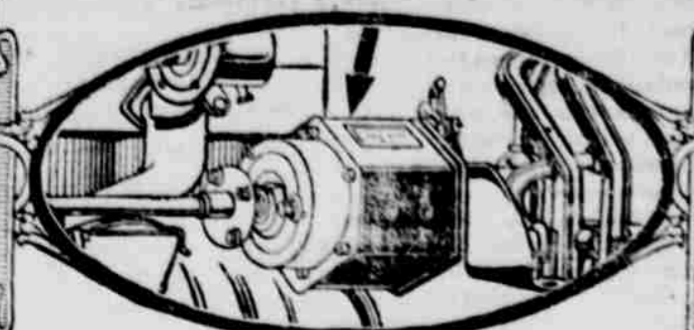

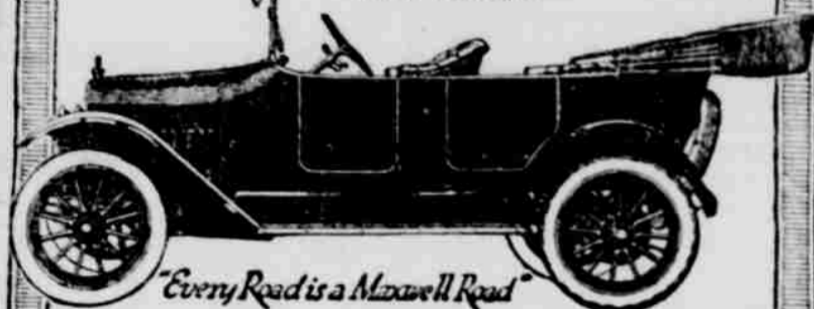

Industrial Review Of Oregon

News Items about Statewide Industries Improvements and Building on The Increase

Salem, Oct. 4.—Campaign is being made for wagon road from Eugene to coast and half mill tax asked.

The Chair Factory at Albany has changed from an eight to a ten hour day.

J. A. Seavey will erect \$20,000 the-

atre in Springfield.

J. C. Butcher will establish large spray factory at Hood River and manufacture arsenate of lead.

The Creswell cannery will manufacture spray in that city.

Creswell—Reports are that the apple market is looking better owing to short crop.

Hillsboro—Committee of Growers Association asks equalization board to make reductions of one-third in valuation of farm lands in that vicinity.

Marshfield—School board figuring on reducing school tax 2 mills, \$41,000.

Bandon—New cheese factory to be built at Four Mile.

Bend—Frank Pival expects to erect 50 houses here, work to begin at once.

Roseburg citizens will donate site for the big new mill of Kendall Bros. A town which has shown the enterprise of Roseburg in going after this big industry is deserving of a bright future.

Portland taxes for 1916 estimated at \$33,000 more than for 1915, an effort will be made to cut this amount, however.

Eugene will soon have Coos Bay coal.

Value of Oregon hop crop this year about \$2,000,000, at 10c.

Coos County has been experimenting with roads planked lengthwise and results are highly successful.

Hood River gets a \$7,500 concrete movie theatre 50 by 100 feet.

S. P. payroll at Eugene for past month was \$11,304.

Woodburn wants merger of all the telephone lines.

O. W. R. & N. Co. payroll at La Grande takes 545 checks.

Construction is being rushed on the new line of the O. W. R. & N. into Harney Valley.

Central Point—Farmers and taxpayers league organized to scrutinize raising and disbursement of taxes etc.

Hood River Apple and Vinegar Co. receives gold medal at Panama Fair.

Indications are that Hubbard shoe factory will soon begin operations again.

Former Pacific Mail liner, Korea goes to England. The company has disposed of most of its ships and will sell balance as fast as buyers can be found, owing to effect of seamen's act.

Sutherlin—Leona mills operate after 8 months idleness.

Lebanon Lumber Co. burned with loss of \$100,000.

Right of way deeds are all secured for Sutherlin railroad and it is announced work will start at once on the grade for the Sutherlin, Coos Bay & Eastern.

Pendleton—Cornerstone for new post office has been laid.

Silverton—New drain and tile factory has started.

It is announced that Redmond will have new fireproof warehouse for handling farm products, size 60 by 150.

J. J. Ellinger has cut the fourth crop of alfalfa this season from his farm near Redmond.

The big Rainier mill has been completely destroyed by fire, loss \$150,000.

It is estimated that the clover seed crop of Linn county will total \$200,000 this year.

The Nashville and Toledo creameries have distributed over \$10,000 each to the farmers of that section the past year.

Ralph McKechnie has six acres of corn near Albany averaging 14 feet in height.

W. F. Turnidge wants farmers around Albany to raise mint and will take all oil obtained.

Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co. announces opening of line between Eugene and Florence.

The general cry from every city, town and village in Washington and Oregon is to reduce taxes. Never before has there been such a determined effort made in this direction.

The Word Bible.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

Goldie Riggs was chosen Queen of the Bridge Carnival at North Bend.

A Douglas county teachers' institute will be held in Roseburg on October 6, 7 and 8.

A Dahlia and Fall Flower show, the first of its kind, was held Wednesday in Oregon City.

The third annual Washington county fair opened October 6 on the fair grounds east of Forest Grove.

Farmers of Carlton have just erected a cooperative creamery at that place and the plant was put into operation last week.

W. W. Laxton, of Oregon City, was appointed chairman of the railway valuation division of the interstate commerce commission.

The state W. C. T. U. convention is being held at Newberg this week. Over 150 delegates from outside of Newberg are in attendance.

J. E. David, about 75 years old, resident of Gilliam county more than 30 years, representative from that district for two terms, committed suicide at a Condon hotel.

The money for purchase of the remaining right-of-way for the Sutherlin railroad has been raised among the citizens of Sutherlin, and the deeds will be turned over at once.

The Amity city council has sold and delivered to the Western Bond & Mortgage company, of Portland, a bond issue of \$15,000 for the construction of a water works system.

Profits of the Western Union Telegraph company in Oregon for the year ended June 30, last, were \$25,275.13, according to the annual report filed with the state public service commission.

With last year's record for attendance surpassed and with exhibits the best in history, the 54th annual Oregon state fair closed its gates Saturday night in the proverbial blaze of glory.

Tentative dates for the convention of the western division of the Oregon State Teachers' association which will meet at Medford were fixed as December 27, 28, 29, by the executive committee.

Six Douglas county pupils obtained first prizes at the state fair, and thereby won the privilege of two weeks attendance at the Oregon Agricultural College summer school with all expenses paid.

In order to get first-hand information from the people concerning the Southern Pacific land grant case, S. W. Williams, special assistant to the attorney general of the United States, is in Oregon.

September was an exceptionally dry month in Astoria. According to the records in local Weather Observer Gilmore's office the rainfall during that month was 1.39 inches or 2.31 inches less than normal.

State Engineer Lewis has approved the application of the Dufur Orchard company for a permit to appropriate the waters of 15 mile creek and eight mile creek for the irrigation of its 6500 acre orchard near Wasco.

Harvey Wells, as receiver for the Horticultural Fire Relief of Oregon and the Oregon Merchants Mutual Fire Assurance association, has filed a petition in the Marion county circuit court for an order permitting him to sue the policyholders who have not paid assessments.

Under the direction of Mrs. George Gerlinger, of Dallas, member of the board of regents of the University of Oregon, a vigorous campaign is about to be launched for funds to finance the erection of a proposed Woman's Memorial building to be built on the university campus at Eugene.

A great tourist hotel to cost in the neighborhood of \$200,000 is to be built by R. T. Dabney, a Portland capitalist, on the outer rim of Crown Point, on the upper Columbia river highway 23 miles from Portland, where the road passes in a horseshoe curve around the edge of a cliff 725 feet above the river.

J. O. Swindler, of Klamath Falls, in co-operation with H. Roland Glaizer, county agriculturist, has demonstrated that sorghum, the great silage crop, can be successfully raised in Klamath county, and on non-irrigated land. Mr. Swindler conducted his experiments on his ranch between Merrill and Bonanza.

Extensive preparations are being made for the convention of the Oregon Mothers' congress and Parent-Teacher association to be held at Corvallis, October 20 to 23. Official delegates to the number of 400 are entitled to represent the various local associations affiliated with the state association, and it is expected that numerous representatives of circles not so affiliated will also be in attendance.

Six fatal accidents marked the week ending September 30, according to reports submitted to the state industrial accident insurance commission. The death roll shows: H. C. Dieckman, Wilsonville; John Moeck, Sherwood; Cecil F. Barringer, Sherwood; Chas. E. Gage, Wilsonville; W. J. McOndoo, Bend; and George J. Noah, Allegany. During the week 203 accidents were reported to the commission.

GRAND JURY REPORT

Compliments County Officials and Recommends Addition to Court House.

The grand jury having completed its work on Wednesday, submitting a report to Judge Bagley. The report compliments the county officials and recommends that the county court levy a tax of half a mill to improve and make addition to the court house. The report is as follows:

We, the grand jury of the County of Tillamook hereby respectfully report that we have now concluded our labors and request that we be discharged from further service. We have examined into the condition and management of the public prisons of the county, and into the condition and management of the offices pertaining to the courts of justice in the county, and also into the condition and management of public records and buildings of the county, and we hereby certify that we have found the same to be in good order and the public records well kept; but would respectfully recommend to the Honorable County Court of Tillamook County, Oregon, as follows:

First, that the steam pipes in the basement of the county court house be covered with asbestos in order to conserve the heat generated by the furnace for heating the county court house; and

Second, that the County Court beginning with the county tax levy for the year 1915, levy one-half mill each year until sufficient taxes shall be raised to make a suitable addition to the said court house, for the reason that some of the offices of most importance therein are becoming crowded, and from present indications it will not be more than two years before the said offices shall be insufficient in size to do the work necessary done therein.

Judge Bagley dismissed the grand jury.
