WATER PERMITS IN TILLAMOOK COUNTY

A special vaudeville attraction is now
on the boards at the Gem Theatre.
The Walmeyer & Ownbey company,
which has appeared in this city on two
previous occasions, is billed for the
Gem all this week. This company is a
high class one, puts on a clean enter-
tainment and has a reputation for deliv-
ering the goods. They gave one of
their usual high class entertainments
at the Gem last night to a crowded
house.

During the quarter ending July 31,
1915, the state engineer issued 152 per-
mits for the appropriation of water,
under which it is proposed to irrigate
23,143 acres of land, develop 352 horse
power and construct 15 reservoirs.
These permits will require the con-
struction of 210 miles of canals and
pipe lines and an estimated expendi-
ture of \$891,242.00.

The following permits were issued
in Tillamook County:
W. S. Cone of Bay City secured a
permit to develop 24 horsepower, di-
verting water from Mapes Creek in
Sec. 31 T 1 N R 9 W. Ralph Welsh
of Blaine, for the irrigation of 6 acres
of land, diverting water from an un-
named creek in Sec. 30 T 3 S R 8 W.
H. M. Farmer of Beaver, for the irri-
gation of 10 acres, diverting water
from an unnamed creek in Sec. 1 T 4 S
R 10 W. Wm. G. Tait of Tillamook
for municipal supply, diverting water
from an unnamed creek in Sec. 32 T 1
S R 10 W.

F. B. Churchman of Sheridan, is in

OPTION TAKEN ON MIAMI RIVER PROPERTY.

While in conversation with Frank
Struby of Garibaldi today, we were

it quite likely, that one of the big tim-
ber interests are securing the land for
a mill site. This is but one of the
signs of approaching prosperity which
no doubt is soon to be ours and will
come with the development of the tim-
ber industry.

VIERECK BAKERY ADDS EQUIPMENT

S. Viereck has added to his bake
shop equipment a Reversible power
bread mixer. The mixer has a capacity
for handling two barrels of flour at
one time and is run by a five h. p.
electric motor. Mr. Viereck now has
one of the best equipped bakeries in
the state.

PIG RAISING PROJECT.

Oregon Agricultural College, Cor-
vallis, Sept. 27.—Oregon boys and
girls engaged in pig raising are to be
given the assistance of a specialist in
pork production, who will devote his
entire time to the industrial club pig
project. An arrangement has been
entered into by the Agricultural Col-
lege Extension division and the Uni-
ted States Department of Agriculture
for cooperation in carrying on this
branch of the work. The new ap-
pointee will be a member of the col-
lege extension staff and work under
the direction of R. D. Hetzel, Exten-
sion Director, in connection with the
State Department of Education.
In making the announcement of the
new policy Professor Hetzel said that
J. L. Allen, a master of agriculture
from the State Agriculture College,
will be recommended to the Board of
Regents and the Department of Agri-
culture for this position. He has had
extended experience in livestock pro-
duction at Cove, Oregon, and has re-
ceived both the bachelor and master
degrees from the Animal Husbandry
department of the College. Under
his direction it is expected that great
progress will be made in this impor-
tant club work. Last year 282 mem-
bers were enrolled for pig raising and
this number will doubtless be doubled
several times within the coming year.
Farmers, stock growers and business
men approve the pork production
project and the state bankers
association offers to lend financial
assistance in purchasing blooded
stock for club members.
