REGISTRATION OF MOTORS IN OREGON SHOWS BIG GAIN

Salem, Oregon, Oct. 12.—From January 1 to September 30, 22,998 motor vehicles were registered in the state, according to figures prepared by Secretary of State Olcott. The total number of motorcycles registered during the period was 3204; the total number of chauffeurs 3804, and the total number of dealers 171.

The increase in the motor vehicle registration over the corresponding period last year is 6877, the increase in motorcycles 246, the increase in chauffeurs' registration 2085, and increase in registration of dealers 62.
