The government has set the dredge Oregon to work on Tillamook Bay. The appearance of the dredge here looks good to us. It is thought that it will take the Oregon somewhat more than a year to complete the project that it is now working on. After that, then what? The ports of Oregon and Washington have had the use of this dredge for years, and it has but recently completed a thirteen mile channel, two hundred feet wide from deep water to Toledo, Ore. Other ports have had liberal use of this dredge and now we think it is Tillamook's turn. We believe that now is the time to start a move towards keeping the dredge here until a channel is made all the way to Tillamook. From what we have been able to learn it is our opinion that the channel could be completed to Tillamook by the Oregon for about \$50,000. If the government would put up half, which it no doubt would do, we ought to be able to raise the other half through the aid of our commercial and farmers organizations. If we strike now while the dredge is with us we will be able to do the work much cheaper than we could if we should have to furnish a dredge of our own. This is a matter of vital importance to Tillamook and the surrounding country, and should receive due consideration, for if there is anything that will keep freight rates where they ought to be it is both water and rail competition.

SCHOOL CELEBRATION AT GARIBALDI

Garibaldi, Oregon, Oct. 27, 1915. (To the Herald)—On Friday evening October 22, 1915, over 200 persons gathered at the new school building to take part in the dedication ceremonies. The night was a stormy one but the audience was large and enthusiastic. The school gave an entertainment which was followed by a basket social, the proceeds of which amounted to about \$85. The money thus raised will be used to equip the hall.

Following the school program, Prof. W. S. Buel, County Supt. of schools, gave an address, dedicating the new hall as a gymnasium for the school, and as a meeting place for the whole community, designating it "The Garibaldi Community Hall." His address was timely and much appreciated. Other speakers of the evening were Prof. Karl Outhank of the Tillamook schools, Prof. English of the Nehalem High School, County Agriculturist R. C. Jones and Rev. H. A. Van Winkle, of the Christian Church, Tillamook. The addresses were very interesting, well received and loudly applauded.

The music of the evening was furnished by the McGhee orchestra of Tillamook and the members of the orchestra certainly did themselves proud. They made many friends at Garibaldi.

MOTHER SMITH PASSES AWAY.

Nancy Narcissus Cable was born in Kentucky on the 17th of December, 1841. When little more than an infant her parents removed with her to Missouri, where they remained until she was nine years of age, when they went to Kansas to live. There she spent her girlhood days, and in 1873 on the 7th day of February she was united in marriage with William Smith. To this union was born seven children two of whom died in infancy.

In 1877 she with her husband and one child crossed the plains locating finally in Spokane County, Washington. After living there eleven years she came to Tillamook County, where she resided until her death, which occurred October 22nd, 1912, at noon at her home near

Blaine. At the time of her death she was 73 years, 10 months and 5 days old. Five years after coming to Oregon her husband "crossed the Great Divide" and for twenty years had been waiting for her on the other side.

She became a Christian at the early age of eleven years and all her life was spent in the service of her Savior. When first converted she joined the Baptist Church remaining a member of that Church for years. After locating at Waverly, Washington, she became a member of the United Brethren Church, but after coming to Oregon she affiliated with the Free Methodist Church of which was a faithful and consistent member until God called her
