

SES DRY ACT

ATTORNEY GENERAL DISCUS-

First- That where the owner and proprietor of a drug store, who is not a druggist, employs a registered pharmocist to sell drugs and dispense prescriptions, the registered pharmaciat must furnish the \$250 bond provided for by the law.

Second-That if a proprietor insists on having a prescription filled for alalcohol when the physician who wrote it is of intemperate habits, both the proprietor who directed the sale and the pharmacist who filled it are equally guilty.

That if the sale is made upon an affidavit to a person of intemperate habits by a pharmacist, who did not know of these habits, his ignorance is not a defense, though it may not be considered in mitigation of the penalty to be inflicted.

Fourth - That from and after Janury 1, 1916, registered pharmacists annot fill prescriptions for any intoxicants, save alcohol.

Fifth-That a prescription presented stating that the alcohol is required for medicinal use without any other specineations or directions is not sufficient as the law provides that such prescriptions must show on their face the purpose for which the alcohol is prescribed.


Sixth-That a physician can administer intoxicating liquor to a patient when it is actually necessary as medicine, but that there is nothing in the law authorizing the sale of the liquor by a physician, and that under the prohibition law there is no provision made for a physician obtaining intoxicating siquor other than alcohol, save the last paragraph of section 12 which provides that any person or family may receive from any common carrier not more advertisement from the Grand Leader than two quarts of spirituous liquors or more than 24 quarts of malt liquors within a period of four successive




