

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

The Eugene cannery has started work to can 6000 gallons of sour kraut.

A proposition to rebuild Modford for \$1,000,000 was decisively defeated in an election.

Allany's city budget for next year contains a provision of \$300 for 12 summer band concerts.

Portland Y. M. C. A. now ranks seventh in point of membership among the associations of America.

The extension division of the Oregon Agricultural college will hold a "movable school" in Dayton November 18, 19 and 20.

Salem high school is football champion of the Willamette valley by virtue of a 7 to 0 victory over Albany high on Willamette field.

In the form of questions and answers, a laymen's primer on the Oregon prohibition law was issued by the Anti-Saloon League this week.

About 100,000 bushels of wheat have been sold on the prohibition market during the past few days at prices ranging from \$1 to \$2 cents.

Thomas J. Lewis, a rancher, 48 years of age, living four miles west of Condon, leaped headlong into a well, breaking his neck. He died instantly.

Willis Trippe, an aged man, who has been in the state hospital for the insane since 1888, died as the result of injuries received when he was struck by a dump car.

Eighteen dealers of automobiles and affiliated lines of Umatilla county met and formed an organization known as the Umatilla County Dealers association.

Demand for the horses, cattle, sheep and hogs raised in Klamath county continues unabated, and the shipments at present average about 30 carloads a week.

Contract for lateral sewers in Enterprise has been let to James Kennedy, a contractor with offices in Portland, Salt Lake and Fargo, N. D. His bid was \$18,822.50 for 25,000 feet of laterals.

With the exception of J. W. Watson, treasurer, whose successor will be appointed by the directors, the entire 1915 board of directors was re-elected at Pendleton. Reports show the last round-up was a financial success.

Carpenters and painters are busy adding new sleeping porches to the dormitories at the Umatilla Indian reservation school. The addition has been necessitated because of the increased attendance at the school.

An apple tree in the orchard of M. Dwyer of Dallas, which did not bloom last spring, is now in full blossom. If the frosts of winter don't nip the ambitions of this creek tree, Mr. Dwyer expects to harvest some early spring apples.

Petitions are being circulated by members of the Cascade Rod and Gun club and others, asking the state fish and game commission to increase the capacity of the present Eagle Creek trout breeding ponds from 400,000 to 1,000,000 fish.

Plans to entertain 10,000 visitors November 20 are being formulated by University of Oregon students, and accommodations and means of entertainment are being provided by members of the committee in charge of the university's first real, big "Homecoming day."

According to the annual report of the Rogue River Fruit and Produce association, while the 1915 pear crop was disappointing in quantity, the prices have been encouraging. The highest price, \$1925, was received for a car of Comice pears, while a car of Bosc brought \$1325.

Surveys and profiles of the watershed of the Umpqua river in Oregon have been completed by the United States geological survey, and the results published in what is designated as water supply paper 379. The chief purpose of these surveys is to show the location of undeveloped water powers.

The deep snow in the mountains has driven the crew of government surveyors out who have been engaged in making a survey of the scenic route from Bennett's pass to Horse Thief falls, a distance of approximately 10 miles on the survey of the proposed government road around Mt. Hood, connecting the Columbia river highway with the Barlow road.

Edward Young of Lakeview has put the question of whether he is entitled to compensation for injuries received when bitten by a mad dog up to the state industrial accident commission. Young, who is employed by the Cottonwood Lumber company, was bitten on the wrist by the dog while on his way to the mill from a collecting trip.

The state board of control has re-elected Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, superintendent of the state hospital for the insane for a four-year term beginning January 1, 1916. In this connection it was stated that Dr. Steiner's reelection was due to a desire on the part of the board to express appreciation of the excellence of his services during the three years he has been superintendent.

Manual Training Instructor Mr. Reed And Little Daughter Rud Down By Auto.

Manual Training Teacher, Mr. Reed, put high school faculty, and little five year old daughter were run down and seriously injured by a drunken, reckless auto-driver last evening at about 7:30 o'clock. Mr. Reed and little girl were on their way to church and were walking on the pavement just in front of Billy Stephens' residence on Stillwell Ave., when an automobile came up from behind them at considerable speed, knocking them both down, and carrying Reed about 40 feet. Shortly after the accident Ray Grate, John Day, John S. Moberg and Webb McCracken were along and found Mr. Reed sitting on the curb in a half-conscious condition. Search was made for the girl and she was found totally unconscious. It was thought at first that she was dead. The injured persons were taken into the Stephens home and Dr. Weir was called. At 11 o'clock a post examination it was found that Mr. Reed was seriously injured on the forehead, that his collar bone was broken and that he was bruised generally. The little girl was hit on the side of the head and face and there are some internal injuries to the head. She was unconscious, but some time, but seems to be talking nicely.

Marshal Myers, and other authorities have investigated the matter and it is thought from the evidence at hand that Earl Ford was the driver of the auto in question. The headlight of the auto was smashed at the time of the collision and the pieces of glass in the road, seem to fit into a broken headlight on Ford's auto.

Later we understand that Ford has made a partial confession. He claims that he may have done it, but if he did he was drunk and did not realize what he was doing.
