ANCONA BOATS NOT SHELLED

Austria Says Vessel Tried to Escape After Being Warned to Stop.

Berlin, by wireless to Sayville, N. Y.—The Austro-Hungarian admiralty officially announced that the Italian steamship Ancona attempted to escape at full speed after a warning shot had been fired across her bows and that the vessel stopped only after being shelled several times by an Austrian submarine, says the Overseas News Agency.

The submarine commander, it is further asserted, allowed the Ancona's passengers and crew 45 minutes to abandon the ship, after which the vessel was torpedoed, sinking three-quarters of an hour later. The report that the submarine fired on the lifeboats is denied.
