

Notice of Appointment of Viewers For Assessing Damages and Benefits in Laying out Streets

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon, has appointed Carl Haberlach, David Manning and T. E. Epplett as viewers to view the following proposed streets, to-wit: An extension of Tenth Street, or the street platted in A. A. Miller's Addition as Seventh Street, from the west line of Miller's Addition to the West line of Block 46 of Thayer's Addition to Tillamook City as provided for by Ordinance No. 298 of Tillamook City, approved August 3, 1915, and has appointed Friday, the 24th day of December, 1915, at the City Hall, in Tillamook City, Oregon, at the hour of 8 o'clock a.m. as the time and place for said viewers to meet for the purpose of making the assessment of damages and benefits arising out of the proposed extension of said street. All persons claiming damages by reason of the appropriation of any property which will be affected by such proposed extension are hereby notified to file their claims for such damages with the City Recorder of Tillamook City, Oregon, on or before the time so appointed.

The boundaries and termini of the proposed extension, and the boundaries and descriptions of the private property proposed to be appropriated for said extension are as follows: Beginning at the Southwest corner of Block 14, of A. A. Miller's Addition to Tillamook City, running thence West to the West line of Block 46, Thayer's Addition to Tillamook, thence South 8 degrees, 12 minutes East 66 feet along said West line, thence East to the Northwest corner of Block 16 of A. A. Miller's Addition aforesaid, thence North to the place of beginning. The private property to be appropriated is all that included within said boundaries, the same consisting of portion of Lots 1, 2 and 3 of Block 46, Thayer's Addition aforesaid, and the tract lying East of said Lot 3 bounded on the West by the East line of said lot and on the North, South and East by the North, South and East boundaries of the tract to be appropriated, being a tract 60 feet North and South by 33 1/2 feet East and West.

County Court Proceedings.

In the matter of the petition to vacate a portion of "Park" in Rockaway Beach, this was continued until the December term. In the matter for claims for indemnity for cattle slaughtered, the following were filed and will be considered next month: Ed. Worthington \$25.00, Peter Erickson 25.00, G. W. Burgess 25.00, A. W. Hess 150.00.

In the matter of final payment on the Fairview and Hunt's bridge roads the claim of \$4,388.93 was ordered paid. In the matter of the resignation of J. J. Spencer as constable for the first justice district, the same was accepted and A. D. Thompson was appointed to fill the vacancy, the petition of Frank La Flamboy being rejected.

In the matter of the resignation of E. P. Marcher as constable for the fourth justice district the same was accepted. In the matter J. J. Hudson for a county road, R. L. Shreve, J. M. Baker and H. M. Farmer were appointed as viewers, to meet at Cloverdale on Nov. 22nd.

In the matter of the petition of Solon Schiffmann for a county road, this was continued until next term, as was also a petition of W. H. Kandle. In the matter of the contract with W. D. Wood on the Geo. R. McKimens county road, an extension of time was granted to complete the road until March 1, 1916.

In the matter of a budget of taxes for the 1915 tax roll, it appearing that it would require the sum of \$319,238.67 to defray the expenses for 1916, Commissioner McKimens entered a protest against the raising of an amount to exceed the sum of \$154,000 for road purposes, but the court thinking that the former amount was necessary, placed that amount in the budget, which appears elsewhere in this issue.

In the matter of the appointment of a person to serve on the County Fair Board, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Wm. G. Tait, Erwin Harrison was appointed on the board.

be extracted. Many, of course, are in worse condition than this. One boy only 10 years old had 12 decayed permanent teeth, and seven others had 10 or more permanent teeth needing dental attention. Eighty-nine per cent of 237 children had one or more decayed teeth. Louis Terman, in "The Hygiene of the School Child," based his figures on actual examinations in a large number of American schools, including several hundred thousand children, estimates that 90 per cent or more of all children in the country have defective teeth. In other countries where examinations have been made, the percentage of children with diseased teeth is even higher, almost always being well over 90 per cent. So the finding in Tillamook were neither unexpected, nor worse than elsewhere.

The injuries produced by defective teeth have been pointed out too often to want detailed attention here. Terman says their influence on the health of the body is of four kinds: (1) decreased power of mastication; (2) toxic effect of pus which is absorbed directly into the blood or taken into the stomach or intestine; (3) reflex nervous disturbances due to pain, impaction of the teeth, etc.; and (4) the possibility of acting as a breeding ground and distributing point for the bacteria which cause acute infectious diseases. Several studies of the effect of defective teeth upon health have been made that so point out more school children have enough defective teeth to interfere seriously with health.

There is also a very marked relation between poor teeth and mental development. In 1912 an experiment was made in Cleveland which seems to demonstrate this conclusively. Forty pupils in a school in one of the poorer districts, all of whom were "repeaters", were chosen. Their teeth were put in good shape, and held to faculty in following instructions by promise of a liberal reward, as well as by visiting nurses, were kept in good shape for a year. Psychological experts tested their mental ability at the beginning and close of the experiment, and found an average improvement of 50 per cent in mental ability at the end. Improvement in school work was simultaneous, only one failing of promotion. This relation is shown in Tillamook. Of the 12 who had 8 or more defective permanent teeth only two could be classed as above the average in scholarship, at least seven were below average and several were retarded in grade in addition.

Sometimes before the examination was made, special instruction in the care of the teeth and the use of the tooth brush was begun. Sample tubes of a standard tooth paste and tooth brush pledgecards were distributed to stimulate interest. "Health officers" in each room reported each morning with condition of teeth as well as hands and finger nails, and otherwise teachers urged the care of the teeth. After the examination this was continued and some effect was made to show the children the advisability of having cavities filled immediately. School closed soon, however, and nothing special was done to reach the parents. A few weeks ago the teachers asked the children how many had had dental work done since the examination, and about 90 out of an enrollment approximately the same as last spring, or about 40 per cent reported in the affirmative. How many of them had their teeth put in good condition is uncertain but the dentists report a considerable number who have had extensive work done, and more coming all of the time, so the results appear to be good.

SHORT NEWS NUGGETS

Wheat from the northwest now is moving across the continent by rail for exportation to Europe. Sunday was the 61st birthday of Pope Benedict and countless messages of felicitations arrived at the Vatican from all parts of the world. Lack of ocean going vessels is largely responsible for the shortage of freight cars. Fifty thousand are tied up on eastern sidetracks on account of inability to unload. Fifteen persons were injured when more than 2000 spectators at the Minnesota-Wisconsin football game at Randall field were thrown to the ground by the collapse of the middle section of the north bleachers. Sending parcels to Germany by parcels post has been discontinued. The Holland-American line declines to accept such shipments on account of delays in examination to ascertain if the packages contain contraband. Nebraska republicans have requested Justice Hughes to permit the use of his name for president on the primary ballot next year. Assent has not yet been given—and likely will not be—the justice declining to enter the race. Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, who has been president of the National American Woman's Suffrage association for 11 years, will not be a candidate to succeed herself at the coming annual election, to be held in Washington on December 14.
