The Monday, Dec. 2, at our regular city election, the voters of the city will be called upon to vote on a franchise ordinance giving the Standard Oil Company privilege to establish an oil station here. There are doubts as to what it would be a fine thing to have an oil station located here and we believe it is everyone will agree with us thus far. But have our people thoroughly comprehended the franchise ordinance this is up for consideration? If not we would advise them to do so. To begin with the ordinance in question contains only one real objection and that is to the effect that all tanks shall not be located nearer than 100 feet to any other building. How does this compare with the Portland regulations which in many cases allow tanks to be placed as near as 20 feet to other buildings, and not nearer than 100 feet to water. Portland has had some cases where tanks were placed so close to buildings that they were a fire hazard. The ordinance further provides that a concrete wall be erected around each tank which shall not be less than 42 inches thick with a level top space between tank and wall. The franchise to be voted on Sunday calls for no restriction on the number of tanks. Neither is anything mentioned in regard to trenches about tanks as to carry off oil in case of an explosion. In fact the proposed franchise does not make any provision whatsoever for the safety of the public in case an explosion should take place or one get into the tanks. Neither is anything said about the amount of oil to be stored on the small plot of ground in question. It seems to us that there ought to be some restrictions. If an explosion should occur and a lot of burning oil should get into the street, what would be the result? It seems that the Standard Oil people may provide for some of these safeguards, but it is our opinion that more safeguards should be provided for in the franchise which we give them, then the people will know that they will be protected. As to the danger which these tanks entail we have the late experience of Portland, where a fire which caused the loss of life through an explosion of an oil tank, and it might not be out of place to mention the gasoline explosion which took place at Astoria, Oreg., last September. That explosion which was caused by a spark from the hammer of a workman who was making some repairs on the tank, caused the destruction of two city blocks with a loss of \$500,000 and the loss of 50 lives, besides those who were injured. The dispatches stated that the force of the explosion threw fire in the air for blocks. The Femeny-Brenner Co. feel that if the oil tanks are allowed to be placed near to their property they will be forced to vacate sooner or later. The interests of this firm should have some consideration. They have maintained quite a payroll during the past three years and are contemplating improvements if they stay here. We believe this firm should have some encouragement.

We would like to see the Standard Oil station located here and we believe that if the proper effort was made they could be located here on ground that would not interfere with existing industry or jeopardize the safety of our people.

County Pomona Grange Meets

Delegates From All Parts of the County Attend Meeting at Fairview Hall

On Thursday afternoon and evening the Pomona Grange of Tillamook County met with the Fairview Grange in regular session. In the morning the regular routine work was taken up and three resolutions were introduced after which everyone sat down to breakfast. In the afternoon the work of the lecture hour was taken up and a fine literary program was rendered. One of the numbers which occasioned considerable fun was the question: "What do you like best about your home?" which was asked of everyone. Some of the answers caused considerable laughter. The discussion of the county budget was deferred until after supper, when County Judge Hare and Commissioners McKinnis and Owens arrived at the hall and gave what information was desired at length. The budget was taken up then by item and discussed. When it came to road matters Commissioner McKinnis answered for his district Judge Hare for his district and Commissioner Owens for his district. One of the principal discussions of the evening was pertaining to the appropriation of \$10,000 for the Bayview road. It seems that the Bayview people have offered to finish the road if the county will appropriate \$15,000. It was finally decided by a vote that if the county would appropriate \$15,000 and the Bayview people would complete the road and put up the bonds for the usual performance of the agreement, the Pomona Grange would endorse the appropriation. The discussion of the budget was carried on until midnight. Much interest was taken in the meeting and most of those present were well satisfied with the outcome of the discussions.

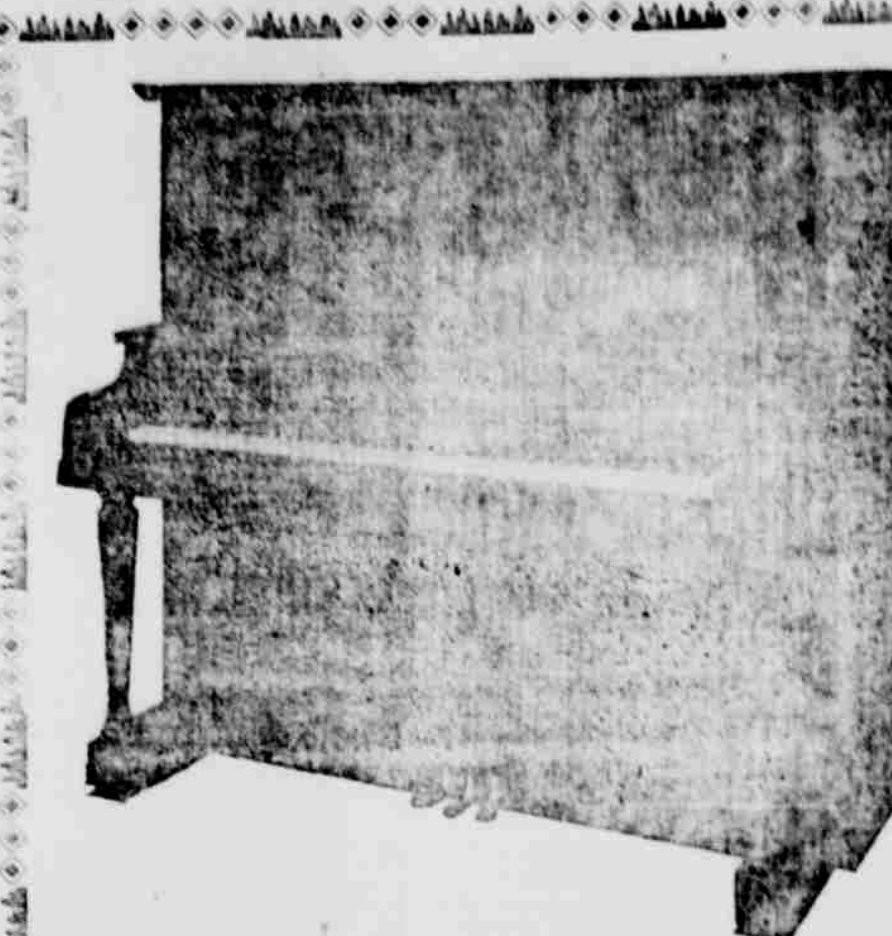

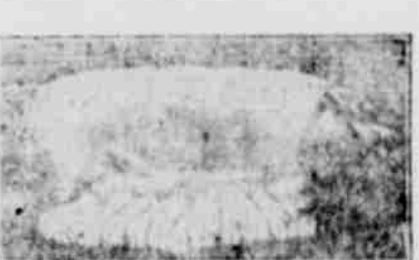

FRED SKOMP LOSES TEAM

On Monday, Fred Skomp, who resides on the Trask River at Sagarata Bend, started for town with a load of apples. When about a mile this side of six miles his team and wagon fell over a steep cliff and the horses were killed.

It seems that the wagon track runs along about a foot from the edge of the cliff and that the lead horse which happened to stumble fell against the outside horse knocking him over the cliff. This pulled the other horse over the cliff also and for a few moments they were suspended in mid air with the wagon still on the road but swung around with the horses. Mr. Skomp jumped off the wagon and tried to alleviate the deplorable situation but before he could do anything team, wagon and all went over the cliff and struck into a bunch of trees after falling about 40 feet. The horses jammed their heads into the trees, one being killed at once and the other lying a short time afterwards. Mr. Skomp's apples were a loss to him, many of them going into the river.

SUMMONS

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Tillamook.

John Lacey, Plaintiff,

George R. Ridgeway, Emma F. Ridgeway, Globe Oil Company, a corporation, Thomas Wayne, Receiver of said Globe Oil Company, and William Zollhofer, Defendants.

You and each of you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit on or before the 12th day of January, 1916, that being a day on and after the expiration of six weeks after the first publication of this summons, that being the time prescribed in the order for the publication of this summons, and if you fail to so appear and answer for want thereof the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief demanded in said complaint; to-wit, for judgment and decree against the said George R. Ridgeway and Emma F. Ridgeway for the sum of \$800.00, and the sum of \$64.00, interest thereon due Oct. 29, 1915, and for the further sum of \$13.30, and \$25.53, and \$12.77, taxes paid on the property hereinafter described on October 30, 1915; making a total of \$935.29; and for interest thereon at the rate of 8 per cent per annum from October 30, 1915, until paid; and for the further sum of \$125.00 as attorneys' fees herein; and for his costs and disbursements in this suit; and decreeing the mortgage set out in plaintiff's complaint and recorded in book "Y" at pages 12 and 13, of the Mortgage Records of Tillamook County, Oregon, to be a first lien on all of the Northeast Quarter, and all of the Northeast Quarter of the Southeast Quarter, of Section
