The itemized road budget was then read by the Commissioner from each district and that of Districts one and three was approved as read by the Grange. When District No. 2 was taken up motion was made to recommend to the County Court that the appropriation for the Boyce road be cut from \$10,000 to \$2,000. After much discussion this motion was lost. It developed during the discussion of this motion that the Boyce people had offered to give sufficient to do for the completion of the road if the County Court would appropriate \$15,000 towards its completion. Motion was made that the Grange recommend to the County Court that the appropriation for the Boyce road be increased from \$10,000 to \$15,000 provided the Boyce people would agree to finish the road and put up suitable bonds to back up their agreement. Motion carried.

Motion that all items of the budget not mentioned above, be approved as read. Carried.

Motion to extend to the members of the County Court a vote of thanks for their courtesy in attending the meeting and answering the questions that arose regarding the budget. A unanimous rising vote was given. Next meeting at Orctown.

### POMONA GRANGE MEETING

Tillamook County Pomona Grange met last Thursday with the Fairview Grange. In the forenoon twelve candidates were initiated.

In the afternoon, after an hour of routine business, the Grange was addressed by Prof. Anna M. Turley of O. A. C. on Industrial Club work and by Prof. J. E. Larsen on Soils and Drainage.

In the evening after the lecturers hour, the main item of business was the discussion of the County Budget. The County Court was present by special invitation, and got a chance to hear the discussions for and against various items and also to answer questions concerning the budget. As the Pomona Grange includes all the subordinate Granges in the county and is therefore a very representative body of the farming interests of the county the action taken at this meeting ought to have considerable influence with the Court.

The first item to be discussed was the appropriation for the County Fair. Motion was made to recommend to the County Court that the \$1000, appropriated for the County Fair be struck from the budget. After discussion, the motion was lost by a large majority.

Motion that Grange recommend to the County Court that the appropriation of \$500 for County Veterinary be struck from the budget. After discussion, the motion was carried.

Motion that Grange recommend to the County Court that the appropriation of \$1500 for County Agricultural work be struck from the budget. After a heated discussion, an amendment was proposed recommending the reduction of the appropriation from \$1500 to \$750. The amendment was lost by a very large majority. The original motion was lost by a six to one majority.

Motion that the Grange recommend to the County Court and to the Agricultural College that Farmer Jones be retained as County Agriculturist. Carried unanimously.

Motion to recommend to the County Court that the Stock Indemnity appropriation be raised from \$500 to \$2000. Carried unanimously.

### WEDDING ANNIVERSARY

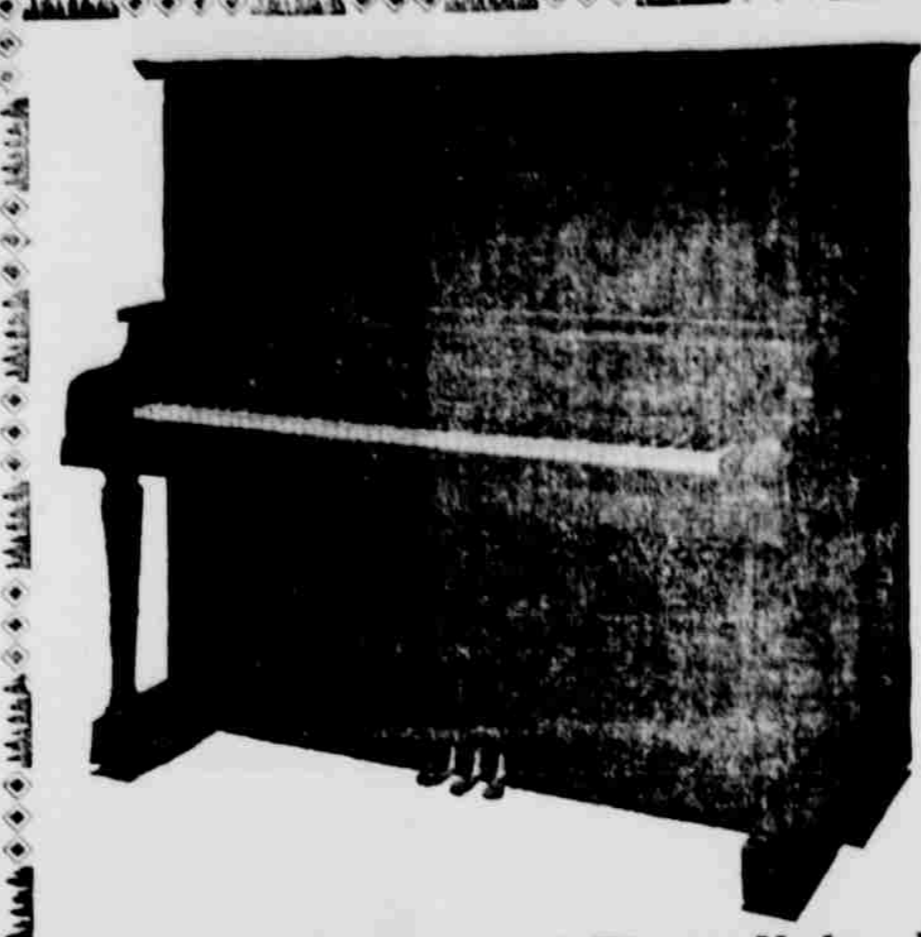

**ARRESTED FOR ASSAULT.**  
On Saturday last District Attorney Goyle and Deputy Sheriff Swenson were called to the north end of the county by the report that a man had been shot.  
Later it was learned that Wm. Barker and Orson Batterson got into an altercation with Anton Lagler, who rents the old Shiffman place two miles north of Mohler, while hunting on the above mentioned place. It seems that Lagler ordered the boys off the farm and later they fired two shots while some distance away, no one was hurt, however.  
The authorities considered, after investigation, that all were more or less to blame for the mixup, and the boys were released after pleading guilty to assault and being fined \$25 and costs, each.

**JAIL BREAK ATTEMPTED.**  
Just as we are getting ready to go to press word comes that Ed Omar who is being held on the charge of burglary attempted to break jail this afternoon at 4 o'clock. He with other prisoners were in the corridor of jail when he succeeded in sawing through one of the iron bars of the window. Mrs. Dan Goodspeed who was visiting opposite
