Tillamook, like any other town, has for some years past harbored a few worthless young men and a great deal of thieving has been going on here for some time by some very slippery people. The disclosures made of late indicate that something ought to be done with young men who have nothing more to do than to lay around town. They should be made to leave town or go to work and if they will not work they should be locked up and fed on bread and water or set at work breaking rocks or given some other arduous labor to do.

The action of the Pomona Grange in endorsing a \$15,000 appropriation for the Bayview road is to be commended. The Bayview interests have offered to complete the road if the county will appropriate \$15,000. The Pomona endorsement was made with the understanding that the Bayview people would furnish bonds to build the road according to proper specifications. This is a good business proposition for the county, it means that Bayview interests will have to expend from ten to fifteen thousand dollars on the road themselves. Bayview is entitled to a road. The Bayview real estate which was formerly a tract of worthless sand, has during the past six years paid, together with other property interests effected by the road, about \$40,000 in taxes. Bayview is certainly entitled to a road.

The Republican house caucus of the House of Representatives at Washington, recently voted for the one-man rule plan whereby all committee appointments are distributed by one man, the Republican leader Congressman Mann, instead of by a vote of a committee on committees. This move on the part of the republican caucus is a backward step and places the Republican party in the same position, as regards this matter, that it was in when Cannon had full sway. This one-man rule and dictatorship idea was one of the things that helped smash the Republican party in 1912, and the late action of the Republican house caucus is but another indication that the reactionary element of the Republican party has again secured control of the party and will run or ruin it. It is but another indication that the Republican party as it now stands cannot consistently demand the support of any true progressive. Past and future events, we are sure, will prove that the Democratic party is the truly progressive party of this country.
