A crowd of boys were arrested on the streets Sunday night by Marshal Myers for being boisterous and noisy. They were put in jail and on Monday were taken before Recorder Aspinwall who released them as he said for want of evidence. Marshal Myers testified that they were making the racket, but they testified that the noise was made by some parties who were passing in a wagon. It is not uncommon for people to be awakened in the middle of the night by boisterous yelling and shouting and we are glad to see the marshals take a hand in the matter. There has been altogether too much of this kind of business.

There is certainly much cause for rejoicing over the trend of events in Tillamook County. The lumber industry is certainly taking on new life. We understand that the big mill and other industries at Wheeler will soon be running on full time and that the Wheeler logging camps at Rector are now being operated with a crew of 80 men. The big mill at Wheeler will employ 300 men when in full operation.

The Brighton mill is now running on full time, and the Coats Lumber Co., mill at Tillamook will soon be running night and day.

The dairy industry is also looking up, cheese now selling at 15¢ per pound, a very remarkable price.

It certainly looks now as though the calamity howler would have a very small place even on the Pacific coast during the coming presidential campaign.

REPORT OF JO DONALDSON, HAND MILKING COMPARED WITH MACHINE MILKING.

After using same three years. In the above report you will see a difference of 147.95 lbs. of butter fat over hand milking for the six months, and 3085 lbs. of milk in favor of hand milking.

I think I would have gotten more milk with the six months of the machine milking but my cows came fresh most early in that year. In year 1912 did not milk any in January, February, 3 cows, March 27 cows but in 1915 had 5 in January, 25 in February & 30 in March, so you can see that the cows in 1912 had it over them a little in 1915 as they freshened some what later.

We get paid on a butter fat basis so the difference of 147.95 at 3¢ per lb. would be \$51.78. I had a saving on labor for the six months in 1915 of the amount \$240.00. We had a saving of 24 hours of time on milking per day. The kind of machine I use is a Sharples.
