

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

The annual meeting of the Oregon Sportsmen's League has been called for December 19 and 20 at Portland.

Indian tuberculosis day in the United States was observed at the Umatilla Indian reservation agency Sunday.

Plans are incubating for raising funds for the reclamation of 100,000 acres of arid land in Crook and Jefferson counties.

Moving pictures are the latest entertainment feature introduced at the Old Soldiers' Home at Roseburg by Commandant Markee.

S. A. Kendall, of Pittsburg, Pa., is in Roseburg to inaugurate work on the \$1,250,000 mill and logging road plant his firm will build.

November building in Eugene, although naturally at an ebb because of the winter, showed an increase of 44 per cent over November, 1914.

William C. White, who died at Hermiton, November 2, at the age of 83, had been a resident agriculturist of Umatilla county for 32 years.

Authority was given by the Oregon public service commission to the Western Telephone company, of Woodburn, to increase its rates for service.

With a total of 200 exhibitors and something like 1200 to 1500 individual birds entered, the seventh annual Poultry and Pet Stock show is being held in Portland.

Practically every town in Clackamas county held its annual election Monday and chose mayors, councilmen, treasurers and other officials for the coming year.

In fixing the annual state levy last week the Portland school board authorized the expenditure of \$345,000 on new school buildings to be erected during the coming year.

Walter Rees, of Cove, has purchased 1800 acres on Crooked Creek, in Lake county, through the Mutual Realty company, of Lakeview. The consideration is reported as \$40,000.

One hundred county judges and county commissioners, representing every county in Oregon, are in Portland this week to attend the annual convention of their association.

The proposed factory near Grants Pass of the Oregon-Utah Sugar company, will be built next spring, arrangements having been made for planting 5000 acres of sugar beets in southern Oregon.

The supervising architect of the treasury was advised by Architect Hobart, of San Francisco, that he had just forwarded to Washington the completed plans of the new Portland postoffice building.

Additional awards granted by the horticultural jury at the Panama-Pacific exposition give Jackson county two more gold medals and one silver medal, which gives Jackson a total of 45 out of 119 awards given Oregon.

C. P. Henkel, superintendent of the Clackamas station of the United States bureau of fisheries, has presented his resignation, to take effect December 15, and is going to Alaska to look after mining interests there.

The supreme court will hear the case of Peterson & Johnson against State Engineer Lewis, involving the question of whether Lewis or Cantline is head of the highway department, on its merits, next Saturday afternoon.

The body of the youth killed by a Southern Pacific passenger train at Salem, while walking on the main line, was identified by Walter Ross and wife, residing three miles south of Salem, as that of their son, Ellis, aged 18 years.

The state fish and game commission has posted notices in Silverton and vicinity that the fishing season in Butte creek, the Abiqua river and Silver creek and their tributaries will be closed from December 10, 1915, to March 31, 1916.

Receipts of the state industrial accident insurance commission for November were \$88,995.58, while the disbursements totaled \$35,781.87. Administrative expenses for the month were \$4722.25. The segregated accident fund shows a balance of \$256,192.52.

Five Linn county cities held municipal elections Monday. Albany elected a full complement of new officers except three councilmen, who hold over. Lebanon chose a mayor and three councilmen, Scio, Sweet Home and Sodaville elected full sets of new officers and in addition Scio voted upon a new city charter.

Of the 172 accidents reported to the state industrial accident insurance commission for the week ended December 2 three were fatal. Those killed were James Pettigrew, of Ponderton, teamster; Leslie McCourt, of Albany, and B. F. Opal, of Price, Utah. The two latter were killed while trespassing on railroad property.

Because he is going blind and in the hope that treatment by expert eye specialists will preserve his sight for a time, the state parole board has recommended to Governor Withycombe that he grant a conditional pardon to A. E. Dodaon, serving a life sentence in the Oregon penitentiary for murder. Dodaon committed the crime in Jefferson county. He has been imprisoned for 19 years.
