## RECORDER COURT NEWS

On the same day E. Kuster was brought before Recorder Aschim on the charge of selling liquor to a minor. He was found guilty and given a suspended sentence of \$50. This is the second time Kuster has been found guilty of this charge and had his sentence suspended.

Billy Stephens was lately fined \$125 on two charges and had his sentence suspended on one before Recorder Aschim, and was later fined \$50 in the circuit court on the charge of selling liquor to a minor. Stephens' friends feel that he is not receiving the same treatment that other saloon men are. While we are not in sympathy with any saloon man's business we feel that they all ought to be treated alike.

## EXAMINATION FOR LICENSE TO TEST MILK OR CREAM

Our dairy law requires that "all testing of milk or cream purchased on

the basis of the amount of butter fat contained therein, shall be done by a licensed tester." To obtain this license, all who have not already done so, are required to take an examination prescribed by the Dairy Dept. of O. A. C. Those who took the examination last year are not required to do so again. For those who do not have a license but who wish to obtain one, an examination will be held Thursday, Dec. 23, at the Tillamook Cheese Factory, Tillamook City.

## MEMBERS OF PORTS MEET

On Tuesday evening the members of the Port of Bay City including J. O. Bazorth, John Nelson and Fred Robinson, met with the members of the Port of Tillamook and discussed matters pertaining to the welfare of the two ports.

After enjoying a dinner at the Hotel Tillamook, adjournment was taken to the parlors of that hostelry where the business of the evening was taken up. The two ports agreed on the sum of \$5,000 to be expended on the channel between Tillamook and Bay City with the use of the old dredge.

A plan was advocated and discussed with the idea of securing a modern up-to-date dredge for the ports of Tillamook, Bay City and Nehalem. It is thought that if these three ports will pull together that the government can be persuaded to make an appropriation for a dredge costing \$50,000, which will have all modern equipments and be plenty big enough to handle the work of Nehalem and Tillamook Bays.

## DEATH OF JUDSON C. GOVE

From Lakeside, (N. Y.) Press: Judson C. Gove, 58 years of age, died at his residence north of the Maple Flats church, Wednesday night about 11 o'clock.

About a week before he had several ribs broken and was otherwise injured by being kicked by a horse, but while serious was not considered especially dangerous. Against the instructions of his physician he persisted in going out of doors and doing this caused pneumonia which developed rapidly because of the congested condition of the tissues around his lungs.

He walked to the home of one of his neighbors Tuesday and Wednesday morning he went some distance from the house in one of his fields. Later in the forenoon one of the neighbors happening in found him suffering intensely. His physician was called as soon as possible but the disease was too far advanced.

Two sisters, one from Belle Isle and one from Rochester, came one arriving a short time before his death and the other a few hours later. The remains will be taken to Belle Isle today where funeral services will be held and interment made next Monday.

Mr. Gove came here from Rochester several years ago and has made exten-

sive improvements upon the farm which he purchased at that time. While eccentric in many ways he was honest and industrious and a kind and obliging neighbor.

Under direct benefit, the surplus or excess water is gotten rid of quickly and air takes the place of the excess water in the soil mass. Air in the soil is as important to growing plants as are plant food and moisture. The excess water must be removed before proper aeration will come. This really increases the soil's capacity to hold usable or film moisture. Drainage improves the soil structure by plowing etc., at the proper season. The soil mellow and livens up with drainage and better tillage. Drainage lengthens the growing season. The land can be worked earlier in the season. Heaving of the soils from freezing is caused by the expansion of the water in the soil. This is overcome by drainage. The feeding area for plants is greatly enlarged which means big crops. Under drainage checks soil erosion.

As indirect benefits we might mention the warming of the soil by the air taken in the soil through drainage. A difference of from six to ten degrees is not uncommon between drained and undrained soils. Air also assists in the decay of organic matter, manures, roots, etc. This means more humus, which forms more available moisture during drought periods. Bacterial activity is at its height in a soil that is warm, aerated and rich in humus. These things all tend to liberate plant food. More available plant food means greater yields. Deep and thorough tillage is needed

to loosen up acerbic soil after drainage. Clover, through its deep rooting system, comes to the rescue. Lime, too, is needed to sweeten the soil and improve its structure. Manures do their maximum benefit only in a well drained soil.

Most of our wet lands are near business centers. Transportation facilities are good. The latent plant food is usually very good. These lands will stand the overhead expense necessary to bring them up to full production. Drainage is the key that unlocks this treasure. -Oregon Semi-Weekly Journal.
