This caused some discussion, Judge fare stating that he did not see how hey could cut out any of the items in the budget as there were quite a num-ber of roads that should be repaired, and he did not see where they could get the money to build four miles of hard surfaced road. When put the resolution was voted down.

Plea Made for Bonding.

A. G. Beals put up a strong argument in favor of hard surfacing the main highway from the Clatsop to Yambill county lines. He stated that was the most speedy and economical way of obtaining bard surfaced roads, for it would take 20 or more years before the hard surfaced road would be finished at the rate they were going. He wanted the present generation to have the benefit of hard surfaced roads, and they could obtain it by bonding. Mr. Beals' remarks were loudly applauded.
