Tomorrow (Friday) night the local I. O. O. F. basketball team will play a return engagement with the Blaine Five on the local high school court. Last Friday night the locals invaded Blaine and came out on the short-end of a 20-7 score. To say that they went out for revenge is but putting it mildly.

H. C. O'Dell, who is managing the squad, is putting his men through severe preparatory practice. Monday night they scrimmaged with the high school and they are otherwise putting themselves into shape for their debut before the home-town folks.

The Blaine team is one of the best and most skilled in the county and to hold them to a close score is the one ambition, right now, of the three links.

The squad has been outfitted with natty new costumes consisting of blue jerseys with the emblem of the order which they represent neatly lettered on the front and numbers on the back. Khaki pants and white stockings.

## THRILLING CONTEST STAGED SATURDAY

Local hoop fans were treated to a pre-season classic Saturday evening when the K. of P. and Tillamook High quintets clashed on the latter's floor.

Score: High school, 17; K. of P. 14.

The game was fast and furious and in the last few minutes of play developed into a sort of football fray, for he it said it was anybody's tussle up to the very instant referee Eberman sounded "taps."

The high schoolers stepped out of their class, insofar as weight was concerned, when they tangled with the former Wilson River five, being outweighed at least ten pounds to the man, but the grueling workouts which Coach French has put his proteges through stood them in hand, their wrist and stamina carrying them through the forty minutes nicely while the K. of P.'s plainly were not in the pink of condition.

The first half ended 9 to 8 in favor of the victors, who took the lead right off by converting three free tries. In the first half the prep schoolers made only two baskets, the other five points coming by virtue of Gabriel's true eye. The lodgemen had six free throws in this half but could not find the hoop.

In the second half manager Funk, of the Knights, shifted his line-up often. They started this half with a bang and at one time had a comfortable lead, but try as they might they could not hold it. Three sensational baskets were hung up in this period. Heisel, star of the game, shot a pretty dinger from left center and Gabriel and Driscoll elicited the 200 or more present by hitting the bull's-eye from difficult and far-away angles.

Gabriel was high point man of the evening, being accredited with 11 out of the high school's 17 points. C. Heisel made the largest number of baskets, shooting over five, or a total of ten of his team's 14 points.

## FRENCH'S SQUAD LOOKS PROMISING

Prospects are indeed bright for a winning basket ball team at the local high school this year. Coach French has five letter-men in uniforms and ten or twelve others turning out for practice. Saturday night the team received its baptism under five when they met the heavy K. of P. team. Only seven men got into the game, but these seven acquitted themselves very nicely.

The team is heavy, averaging about 148 or 150 pounds. Their style of play is fair to be the foundation of many an alibi for opposing teams before the curtain has been rung down on the season, or we miss it a mile. French has adopted a style of play as used in the east, and while we are not going to tip his hand here, yet we will say: "it ought to work against the best Oregon can put out."

Manager Gabriel, brother of the lad who is playing center for the team, is managing the business end of the game. He has booked a game with the Cloverdale team at that place tomorrow (Friday) night and has closed for two games with Newberg, and is negotiating for dates with West Linn, Forest Grove, Dallas and Dayton. He will also send them against Blaine and may offer the K. of P. team a return game.

On January 27 the locals will go to Newberg and may play the Dayton team the following night. On February third the season will officially open here with a return game with Newberg.

The team donned their new uniforms for the first time Saturday night. They are outfitted with outstanding white V-necked jerseys with a Maroon stripe, white gym pants trimmed with Maroon and lettered with a black letter "T". Stockings are white with red stripes.

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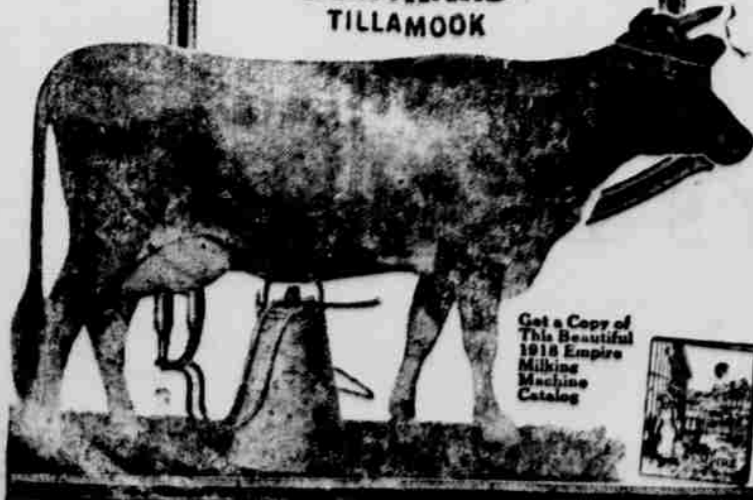
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
