NOTICE TO TILLAMOOK CONFERENCE GIRLS

50 MILE MAIL ROUTE

Beginning February 1, there will be conducted from Tillamook City post office a 50 mile Rural Route to take the place of the present R. F. D. No. 1. Frank Hunter who is now mail carrier, will have charge of the route.

Following are the regulations of the route, pertaining to mail boxes, etc.

Persons desiring box delivery and section service on route shall provide and erect, at their own expense, boxes conforming in every respect to the department specifications and officially approved.

Two standard sizes have been adopted. No. 1--18 1/4 inches long, 6 1/4 inches wide 7 1/4 in length, for letters and ordinary mail. No. 2--23 1/4 inches long, 11 in wide, 14 in high, for all mail including parcel post.

The following instructions shall be used on rural mail boxes, other instructions not being permitted: A name of owner; B name and address of manufacturer; C, the words "approved by the postmaster general," U. S. Mail.

Each box shall be erected on the right hand side of the road regularly traveled and in such position as to be easily and safely accessible for the delivery and collection of mail by the carrier. It is expected that postmasters will endeavor to have boxes placed in conformity with this requirement; full report to be made of instances in which patrons fail or refuse to comply with reasonable requests for re-location of boxes.

Patrons shall keep clear the approaches to their boxes by promptly removing obstacles which may render difficult or impossible the delivery of mail by the carrier.
