## BLAINE WINS ODD GAME AND SERIES

The Blaine team proved itself the better in the third and deciding game of the three-game series played with the Tillamook Odd Fellows on the high school floor last Friday night. Score 29 to 12.

The lodgesmen were out-played in every department, not putting up the defense that they did the week previous when they won by a one-point margin, and shooting erratically, while on the other hand the Blaine team greatly surprised local basketball followers by putting up a stonewall defense and running the floor in unison.

The Cougars took the lead first off, Perry dropping one in at forward. At the end of the first five minutes they had made seven markers all told, while the lodgesmen had scored one lone foul shot. This was the end of things, as far as O'Dell's three-link lads were concerned, for it was at this juncture that Stormer, star forward of the team, was forced to retire to the dressing room with a badly lacerated cheek suffered in a collision with Hollett, Blaine's running guard. Thomas, a new man on the team, was sent in in Stormer's place but was relieved in a few minutes by manager O'Dell himself. Stormer's absence from the line-up broke up all semblance of team-work and Hollett, Perry and Scott "ran wild" on the locals.

Nelson, playing at center for Blaine, distinguished himself in this game by playing a remarkable game at passing and ringing up two field goals. Altenberger, guard, was a demon and Scott was on the busy end of more than one fast play.

Blaine used the short pass very successfully and time after time zig-zagged from one end of the floor to the other and shot for two points, while the losers attempted to win by shots from the center of the floor, but all in vain.

Conover, center for the I. O. O. F. lads, played a brilliant game, but the Anderson brothers could not get going. C. Anderson made some mighty sweet looking passes but could not shoot with any accuracy.

Hollett was high point man of the evening with five field goals and a foul. Conover was high man for the local's with seven markers.

A dandy crowd was out and greatly enjoyed the contest, which was fast and aggressive but not rough, despite the fact that at least three players had three personal fouls called on them. Blaine fouled 12 times and Tillamook six. The refereeing was good, Messrs. Edson and Foster keeping the game well in hand at all stages.
