The following is a copy of the original document granting authority for the institution of Tillamook Lodge 1437.

West Toledo, Ohio Dec. 14, 1921.  
Mr. J. C. Turner, Secretary  
Tillamook, Ore.

Dear Brother Turner:  
I am today granting dispensation No. 1437 for the institution of Tillamook Lodge and have sent all papers to the Grand Secretary, Fred C. Robinson, Congress Hotel, Chicago, with instructions to issue the dispensation. I am writing the District Deputy, Brother Ben L. Norden of Portland and the Secretary of McMinnville Lodge, that the dispensation has been granted.

Grand Exalted Ruler.

Actual work on organization of the Tillamook Lodge commenced about September 15, 1920. On that day a first meeting of thirteen Elks was held at the K. P. hall. The Charter list was circulated in May, 1921, at the first recognition from the Grand Lodge, when an application for charter blank was sent. The Charter List and the recognition of the President of the State Association, George T. Collins, and also the recognition of the McMinnville Lodge, was sent December 2, 1921, to Grand Exalted Ruler W. W. Mountain, West Toledo, Ohio. The authority for the lodge was granted December 14, 1921.
